TRAMP AT CHESTER.

A special from Chester, Sample

County, says: Yesterday, about 3 p.m., a tramp called at the house of Mr. Frank B. Canfield, at Chester, and demanded the keys to Mrs. Canfield, who was sick, the keys to the trunk. She refused. He seized her by the throat and threw her to the floor. The doctor says she was outraged.
