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POLICE ITEMS.

The List of Offenders Against the Peace of the City.

In the Police Court on Saturday afternoon May Hart was tried on a charge of keeping a house of prostitution in the Wasatch block, and was found guilty. She was fined \$50, which she paid.

Mary Hart was tried for resorting to the Hart woman's place with W. T. Devereux, of Grand Junction, Colorado, for immoral purposes, and being convicted was sentenced to ten days' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$50.

Devereux, whose case comes under the Territorial statute, is to be tried this afternoon.

This morning one of the culprits who came before Justice Pyper gave his name as Frederick Thornton. He was charged with petty larceny, the crime having been committed about 12 o'clock on Saturday night. Thornton is a large and powerfully built man, and when he faced the judge he looked as though he had been struck by John L. Sullivan or a Missouri cyclone. His joints seemed to move rather stiffly, his head was swollen and the surroundings of both eyes were so badly discolored and puffed out that he could hardly see. An inquiry was instituted, and showed on Saturday night Mayor Armstrong went out to discover the cause of an unusual noise among his poultry. His investigations revealed the fact that a man was up in a tree taking possession of several fine turkeys. The intruder was ordered down, but his actions showed that he meant mischief. The mayor caught up a brickbat and threw it at the thief, effectually disabling him and producing the results above stated. The accused pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and be imprisoned for thirty days.

THE LEGISLATURE.

COUNCIL.

January 30, 1888.

Roll called. Marshall, Tuttle and Stewart absent.

A communication was received from Dr. Park, president of the University of Deseret, inviting the Council to visit the University including the deaf mute department at any time that might suit the convenience of the Council. One motion of Woolley the invitation was accepted with thanks.

A communication was received from the House enclosing H. F. 81, making appropriations for legislative expenses. The bill was read the first time by its title and referred to the committee on appropriations.

Woolley presented a report from the committee on judiciary on C. F. 15, a bill to amend several sections of the act in relation to civil procedure in the Utah Territory, recommending that it be passed. The bill was read the first time and the committee was adopted; the bill was ordered printed and filed for second reading.

Woolley presented a second report from the judiciary committee on C. F. 15, recommending its rejection and the substitution of the following: A bill amending section 10, chapter 10, Title 10, of the compiled laws of the Territory of Utah.

By a yeas and nays the Governor and Legislative Assembly of Utah, that section 10, chapter 10, Title 10, of the compiled laws of the same is hereby amended as follows:

Every person who deals, plays or carries on, opens or causes to be opened, or who conducts, either as owner or employee, whether for hire or not any game of faro, monte, roulette, lansquenet, vingt et un, rondo or any other game played with cards, dice or any other device, for money, check, credit, or any other representation of value is guilty of a misdemeanor.

The report of the committee was adopted and the bill filed for second reading.

C. F. 11, relating to a fourth district judge, was called up, but at the request of Bryan consideration was postponed till tomorrow.

On motion of Woolley C. F. 14 was passed by the Council and forwarded to the House for their consideration. The table being clear of business the Council then adjourned till 2 p. m. tomorrow.

HOUSE.

January 30, 1888.

Farnsworth introduced a bill from the county clerk of Beaver County, calling attention to the condition of the bridge across Bear River, and asking an appropriation of \$1,500 to assist that county in constructing a new one.

McLaughlin introduced a petition from citizens of Woodland, Summit County, asking for an appropriation of \$1,000 for road purposes. Same committee.

King said that the committee on municipal corporations and towns was organized to make a report on the bill for the classification and government of cities. He stated that the committee had decided to report on the bill and incorporate it in the general bill relative to municipal corporations, while the three of the committee desired to report it for passage.

After a discussion the bill was referred to the committee on municipal corporations and towns.

Thurman supported Allen's motion, as did Crook, both thinking the House should take immediate action on this measure.

Moyle had no objection to an early consideration of this bill, but said the municipal committee had several bills relating to municipal corporations and towns under consideration, and a view to incorporating the good features of all of them in a general bill, and he favored the delay of this bill until the general one could come up.

Hoge criticized the action of the committee and urged Allen's motion to take the bill up special order for Wednesday. The motion was lost.

Thurman moved that the committee on municipal corporations and towns be instructed to report on the bill at the earliest possible date. Carried.

Match from the claims committee, reported that \$300 of Daniel Harrington's claim for services as minute clerk of the last House, was included in the appropriation bill, and recommended that \$30 of it, interest, be not allowed.

The same report recommended the allowance of A. G. Johnson's claim, as ex-assessor and collector of Tooele.

Richards introduced a bill to amend the law and game law, which was referred to the committee.

In support of his position in relation to the numbering of sections in a bill, the Speaker read from the revised manual. But in answer to a question from Richards as to whether what he had just read applied to the present case, the Speaker said he was in doubt, but would look further into the matter.

At 2:55 the House adjourned.
