

HOW RESERVATION WILL BE OPENED.

Special Agent Linnen Says Rosbud Regulations Will Doubtless Govern.

WHAT THE REQUIREMENTS ARE

President's Proclamation Should Come in a Few Days—Size of the Reserve.

As stated by Hon. W. A. Richards, commissioner general of the United States land office at Washington, D. C., it is quite certain that regulations similar to those governing the opening of the Rosbud reservation in Dakota last year, will obtain at the opening of the Utah reservation in this state. This also is the opinion of E. B. Linnen, special agent of the general land office, who has spent the past few weeks at Vernal securing quarters for the new land office and arranging other matters preliminary to the opening of the reservation.

Asked by the Eastern Utah Advocates to give out what information he could concerning the opening, the gentleman stated that while the exact rules which are to govern are not yet definitely settled by the interior department, the general outline of the proclamation which opened the Rosbud reservation in Dakota last year will likely be followed. In the bill providing for the opening of the Utah reservation, it is fixed as the date when it will occur, and as 60 days must elapse between the issuance of the president's proclamation and the opening, it is therefore thought that the former will be made public almost any day now.

Following the rules of the Rosbud opening, several points of registration will be designated, and of which there will be one. The registration will probably begin within two weeks after the issuance of the president's proclamation. It will be a part of Linnen's duty to arrange the necessary facilities for the registration, such as providing quarters, booths, etc. He expects that the registration will be very heavy, and a force of 30 extra clerks will be sent out from Washington to do the work at the different points.

At the Rosbud opening there were 107,000 persons registered, and there were 2,600 claims. There seems to be a difference of opinion regarding the probable number that will register for the present opening, some placing the number as low as 10,000 and some as high as 100,000. Inspector Linnen is of the opinion that the number will be large, and states that the people do not realize what an avalanche is coming between now and Sept. 1. A synopsis of the proclamation issued at the time of the Rosbud opening will be of great interest at this time. It reads as follows:

ROSBUD REGULATIONS.

"To obtain registration each applicant will be required to show himself duly qualified, by written application to be made only on a blank form provided by the commissioner of the general land office, and to be filled out by the applicant under existing laws, and to give the registering officer such appropriate matters of description and identity as will protect the applicant and the government against any attempted impersonation. Registration cannot be effected through the use of the mails or the employment of an agent, excepting that honorably discharged soldiers and sailors entitled to the benefits of section 2204 of the Revised Statutes of the United States as amended by the act of Congress, approved March 1, 1901 (31 Stat. 847), may present their written application and due proof of their qualifications through an agent of their own selection, having a duly executed power of attorney, but no person will be permitted to act as agent for more than one such soldier or sailor. No person will be permitted to register more than once or in any other than his true name.

"Each applicant who shows himself duly qualified will be registered and given a non-transferable certificate to that effect, which will entitle him to go upon and examine the lands to be opened hereunder, but the only purpose for which he can go upon and examine said lands is that of enabling him, as herein provided, to understand fully the lands for which he will make entry. No one will be permitted to make settlement upon any of said lands in advance of the opening herein provided for, and during the first 60 days following said opening, no one registered applicant will be permitted to make homestead settlement upon any of said lands, and then only in pursuance of a homestead entry duly allowed by the local land office, as of a soldier's discharge statement duly accepted by such officers.

ORDER OF ENTRY.

"The order in which, during the first 60 days following the opening, the registered applicants will be permitted to make homestead entry of the lands opened hereunder, will be determined by a drawing for the district publicly held at Chamberlain, S. D. The drawing will be held under the supervision and immediate observation of a committee of three persons whose integrity is such as to make their control of the drawing a guaranty of its fairness. The members of this committee will be appointed by the secretary of the interior, who will prescribe suitable compensation for their services. Preparatory to this drawing the registration officers will at the time of registering each applicant who shows himself duly qualified, make out a card, which must be signed by the applicant, and giving such a description of the applicant as will enable the local land officers to thereafter identify him. This card will be subsequently sealed in a separate envelope which will bear no other distinguishing label or mark than such as may be necessary to show that it is to go into the drawing. These envelopes will be carefully preserved and remain sealed until opened in the course of the drawing herein provided. When the registration is completed, all of these sealed envelopes will be brought together at the place of drawing and turned over to the committee in charge of the drawing, who, in such manner as in their judgment will be attended with entire fairness and equality of opportunity, shall proceed to draw out and open the separate envelopes and to give each enclosed card a number in the order in which the envelopes containing the same is drawn. The result of the drawing will be certified by the committee to the officers of the district and will determine the order in which the applicants may make homestead entry of said lands and settlement thereon.

HOW DRAWINGS ARE MADE.

"Notice of the drawings, stating the name of each applicant and number assigned to him by the drawing, will

be posted each day at the place of drawing, and each applicant will be notified of his number and of the day upon which he must make his entry, by a postal card mailed to him at the address given by him at the time of registration. The result of each day's drawing will also be given to the press to be published as a matter of news. Applicants for homestead entry of said lands during the first 60 days following the opening can be made only by registered applicants and in the order established by the drawing. The land officers for the district will receive applications for entries at Chamberlain, S. D., in their district, beginning Aug. 8, 1904, and until and including Sept. 10, 1904, at 9 o'clock a. m., the applications of those drawing numbers 1 to 200, inclusive, must be presented and will be considered in their numerical order during the first day, and the applications of those drawing numbers 201 to 400, inclusive, must be presented and will be considered in their numerical order during the second day, and so on at that rate until all of said lands subject to entry under the homestead law, and desired thereunder, have been entered. If any applicant fails to appear and present his application for entry when the number assigned to him by the drawing is reached, his right to enter will be passed until after the other applications assigned for that day have been disposed of, when he will be given another opportunity to make entry, failing in which he will be deemed to have abandoned his right to make entry under such drawing.

HOMESTEAD ENTRIES.

"To obtain the allowance of a homestead entry, each applicant must personally present the certificate of registration with a regular homestead application, and the necessary accompanying proofs, and make the first payment of one dollar per acre for the land embraced in his application, together with the regular land office fee, but an honorably discharged soldier or sailor may file his declaration statement with his agent, who can represent him one soldier or sailor as in the matter of registration. The completion of the certificate of registration will be dispensed with only upon satisfactory proof of his loss of destruction. If at the time of considering his regular application for entry of said lands, the applicant is disqualified from making homestead entry of these lands, his application will be rejected, notwithstanding his prior registration. If any applicant shall register more than once, however, or in any other than his true name, or shall transfer his registration certificate, he will thereby lose all the benefits of the registration and drawing herein provided for, and will be precluded from entering or settling upon any of said lands during the first 60 days following said opening.

METHOD OF SETTLEMENT.

"All persons are especially admonished that under the said act of Congress, approved April 23, 1904, it is provided that no person shall be permitted to settle upon, occupy or enter any of said lands except in the manner prescribed in this proclamation until after the expiration of 60 days from the time when the same are opened to settlement, and until after the expiration of the said period of 60 days, but not before, and until the expiration of three months after the same shall have been opened for settlement and entry, as herein provided, and until the expiration of six months after the same shall have been opened for settlement and entry, as aforesaid, any of said lands remaining undisposed of may also be settled upon, occupied and entered under the general provisions of the homestead laws of the United States in the manner as if the manner of effecting such settlement, occupancy and entry had not been prescribed herein in obedience to law, subject, however, to the payment of \$1 per acre for the land entered, in the manner and at the time required by the said act of Congress above mentioned. After the expiration of three months, and not before, and until the expiration of six months after the same shall have been opened for settlement and entry, as aforesaid, any of said lands remaining undisposed of may also be settled upon, occupied and entered under the general provisions of the same laws and in the same manner, subject, however, to the payment of \$1 per acre for the land entered in the manner and at the time required by the same act of Congress.

LANDS REMAINING.

"After the expiration of six months, and not before, and until the expiration of one year after the same shall have been opened for settlement and entry, as aforesaid, any of said lands remaining undisposed of may also be settled upon, occupied and entered under the general provisions of the same laws, and in the same manner, subject, however, to the payment of \$2.50 per acre for the land entered, in the manner and at the time required by the same act of Congress. And after the expiration of four years from the taking effect of this act, and not before, any of said lands remaining undisposed of for said years, under laws and regulations to be prescribed by the secretary of the interior, not more than 400 acres to any one purchaser."

SIZE OF RESERVATION.

"The total area of the Utah reservation is 2,600,000 acres. Of this amount approximately 120,000 will be acquired for Indian allotments, and the balance will be subject to entry under the homestead law. The bill opening the reservation. Under the federal statutes each entryman will be required to pay \$1.25 per acre, aside from the regular filing fee. The rules governing the payment of this \$1.25 per acre will be published immediately following or at the same time the opening proclamation is issued and will not be known until then.

"The total cost of the land will be \$1.25 an acre, or on 400 acres, \$500. The \$1.25 land office fee making \$24, of which only \$24 must be paid at time of making selection. Of course, these figures are not official, but it is believed the president, in his proclamation, soon to be issued, will divide the \$1.25 into payments such as are now required by the government where lands are sold at that figure.

"The general land office has recently decided that the state will be entitled to any interest in the lands of the reservation, consequently there will not be any school lands, nor state sections of any kind.

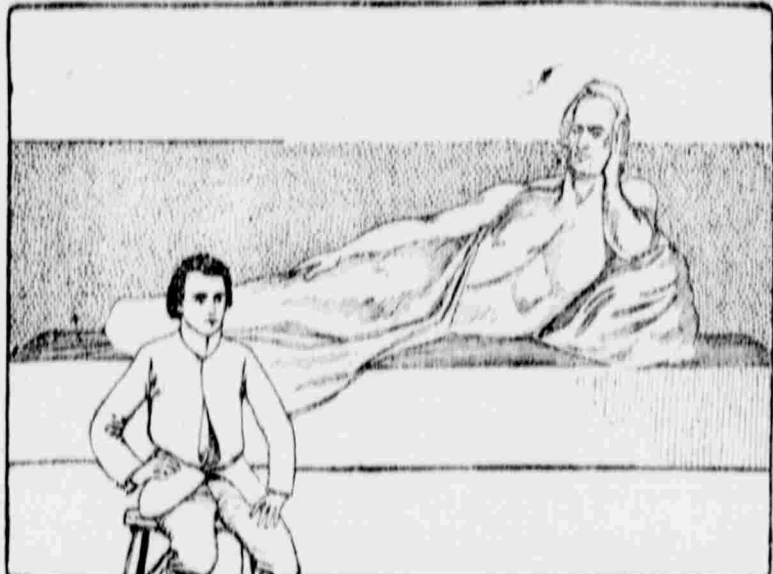

MEASURES APPROVED.

Those Closing City Creek to Autos and Imposing Sidewalk Tax, Signed.

The ordinance passed by the city council on Wednesday night, prohibiting automobiles from using City Creek canyon, has been signed by Acting Mayor F. J. Hewlett and is now in full force and effect. Any person violating the ordinance may be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and may be sentenced to not more than six months in jail or may be fined not to exceed \$200, or both such fine and imprisonment may be imposed.

The ordinance levying an assessment for a repaved sidewalk on the east side of State street from Hillside avenue to Second North street and also on the west side of Center street from Vine to Pearl street have also been approved by Mayor Hewlett. He also signed the ordinance creating sidewalk districts Nos. 39, 40 and 41, located in the southern and southwestern parts of the city.

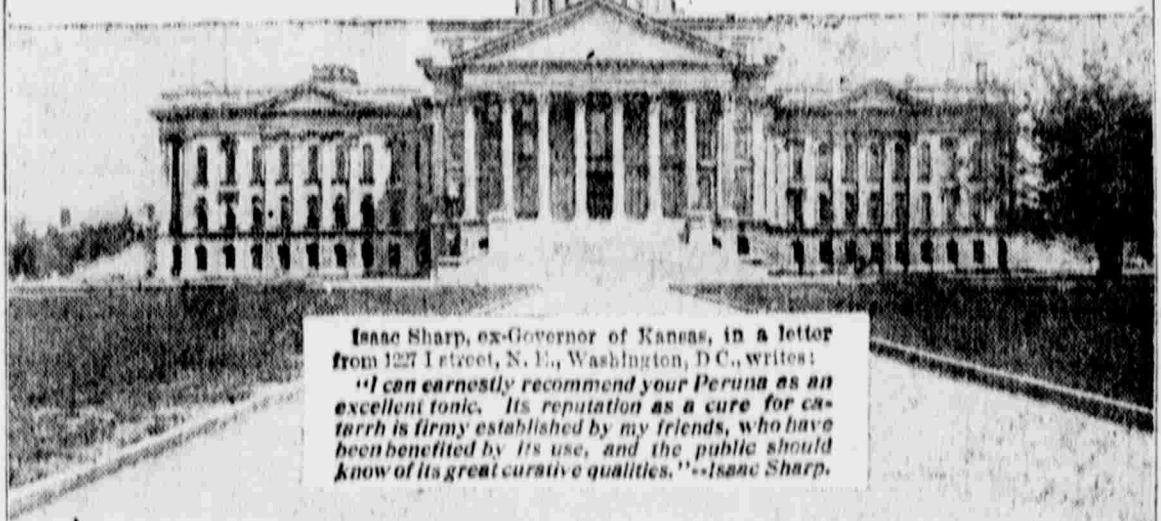
SPRINKLING FIRE ESCAPE.
