A NEW SOURCE OF OIL—CANNELITE.

—A mineral, possessing somewhat of the nature of both coal and bitumen, is found in several places—among others, in New Brunswick, in Wales, in Scotland, and in Nevada. It is called "Cannelite," and recent discoveries show that it is a solid petroleum almost in a pure state. The best, when distilled, will yield fully fifty gallons of crude oil to the ton of 2,240 pounds; It gives up its volatile products with great facility, does not swell in the retort, and the process can be completed in about eight hours. It is found in different varieties, some of them leaving a residuum in the vessel similar to lava; others a whitish ash, which is very light, but retains the form of the original material until it is disturbed. That found in New Brunswick is in beds of two to thirteen feet in thickness. Nearly 3,000 tons of this substance have been imported into Salem, Massachusetts, for distillation, and gave on an average fifty gallons of oil per ton, only costing at the place of shipment \$8 per ton, or 12½ cents per gallon on the yield. The trade has been temporarily stopped by the abrogation of the reciprocity treaty with the British provinces. The deposits already known to exist in New Brunswick contain more than 20,000,000 tons, or 1,000,000,000 gallons of crude oil of the specific gravity of 29 degrees Beaume. In Wales, also, the business of cannel distillation has made some progress, 500 retorts have already been erected, each of which can distil 25,000 gallons a year. Thus year by year accident or scientific research discovers new treasures, which, veiled by nature, have escaped the observation of our forefathers, but which only requires industry and capital to make them as valuable to a practical people like the Americans as the precious metals of the Pacific States. —[Philadelphia American.
