TALK ON THE SPARROW. WANT LOWER RATE. Utah Sheepmen Claim They Are Under

Prof. S. H. Goodwin of Logan Address. es Gatherign of Teachers.

At a meeting of the teachers of the A committee of sheepmen, including public schools, held at the LaFayette E. H. Callister, president of the Utan Saturady, Prof. S. H. Goodwin, of the Agricultural college, Logan, delivered an address on "The Sparrow." The little bunch of activity that is the special aim of the flipper of nearly every boy in the community and whose ergs are secured by the thousand for the bounty paid by the state, was de-signated by Prof. Goodwin as a "house sparrow," rather than "English spar-row." Among the observations made by the speaker were the following: "The sparrow is not a native bird. It was first imported in 1850, but these birds died. The importation of 1852 thrived and multiplied. The importa-tion of 1872 gave to Utah this unde-sirable pest-a pest that has cost the country millions of dollars. They have spread to all parts of the state. AUSTRIANS ARRESTED.
