TALK ON THE SPARROW.

Prof. S. H. Goodwin of Logan Addressed. es Gathering of Teachers.

At a meeting of the teachers of the public schools, held at the LaFayette Saturday, Prof. S. H. Goodwin, of the Agricultural college, Logan, delivered an address on "The Sparrow."
