LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THE THEATRE TO-NIGHT.—Everybody remember the Theatre to-night. The irrepressible George Francis Train will make his third appearance before the people of this city, and deliver one of his eccentric and interesting lectures. To say that he is a great talker is unnecessary; the people here have heard him twice, and they indorse the general opinion in regard to Mr. Train, that as a terse, original talker or orator he has scarcely an equal living. Attend to-night and hear him descend as he only can about the "Blackened Sepulchres" of the East and various "rings" and abominations that exist there; also his defence of the Mormon leaders and people. The admission fee is low, and a chance to hear such a lecture will not be presented again in a hurry.

WHAT NEXT.—It will be observed by reference to an advertisement in to-day's paper that it is the intention of a gentleman now in town to give rather a novel exhibition, that of a living head apparently severed from the body.

MR. MONTGOMERY'S READINGS.—The Theatre last night was by no means crowded, to hear Mr. Walter Montgomery, the famous elocutionist, but there was a fair house, and a second appearance of the gentleman we have no doubt would be much more numerous attended. Mr. Montgomery did not make his appearance until close on a quarter past eight, and then very briefly introduced himself and explained the nature of his performance; and before each of the selections from Shakespeare he gave a brief recapitulation of the historical events of the times in English history, which the great dramatist has so finely illustrated. To criticize the reading of such an elocutionist as Mr. Montgomery is all but superfluous; where the perfection of art is reached it is uncalculated for and unnecessary. After hearing the "Seven Ages of Man," "Richard and Arthur," "The Halls," and "The Charge of the Light Brigade," we are not surprised that the elocutionist is acknowledged to be at the head of his profession. Those "bells" will not soon be forgotten by those who had the pleasure of hearing them; the alarm bell, with its wild screams, and the funeral bell, with its solemn moan were especially natural and powerful as there are Tennysons and Montgomerys so long with the fame of that terrible light cavalry charge at Balaklava live and kept green in the memories of men. The readings closed at about five minutes

to ten, and we heard but one expression with regard to them,—namely, intense admiration and satisfaction.

NO EASTERN TRAIN LAST NIGHT.—A dispatch per W. U. telegraph line, says no eastern train arrived at Ogden last night, the reason being that the railroad bridge, at Fort Steele, was burned, it was supposed by Indiana.

INCIDENTS IN THE LIFE OF A BLIND GIRL.—We had a call this morning from Miss Mary L. Day, a blind lady, and authoress of the "Incidents in the Life of a Blind Girl." She is a graduate of the Maryland Institute, and the book which she has published was written while at that Institute, not with a view to its publication but as compositions. Miss Day's health became so much impaired that she had to give up teaching and leave the Institute, the doctors informing her that she could not live long if she did not travel. Then the idea suggested itself of publishing the incidents in her life, which she did, and by its sale she has since succeeded in sustaining herself. She is now en route for California, from which State it is her intention to go to Texas, thence up through Arkansas and Missouri. She intends to publish a supplement to her book when she has completed her journey. Her health is still frail; but she has experienced relief from traveling, and she has hopes that she may regain her sight. She will offer her book for sale. It is a neat volume and she sells it at one dollar. Her case will doubtless call forth the sympathy of the benevolent of this city.
