People Want Utah Lake Water for Use in Utah County.

IMPORTANT WATER QUESTION.

Sometime ago Messrs. J. H. Gardner and A. J. Evans made a filing on a portion of Utah Lake waters in behalf of the Lehi Commercial club being proposed at the time to pump this water out to the Lehi fields, which plan has been abandoned for the time being. The filing has been contested by the canal companies of Salt Lake county. It is now proposed to make this a test case, and a committee of the Commercial club has been appointed to solicit aid from the irrigation companies and towns of Utah county, to carry the case through the courts. The question is a most vital one as much more water is needed and it could be pumped on to the land if the old users of the water did not object to the use of Utah Lake water in Utah county.

DESTRUCTIVE BLAZE.

J. E. Gunderson Loses Restaurant and Pool Room; Loss \$2,500.

Mt. Pleasant, Sanpete Co., Aug. 25.—At midnight last night, the restaurant and pool-room of J. E. Gunderson with the contents were totally destroyed by fire.

An oil stove in the restaurant was the cause of the fire, and before the fire company had time to get upon the ground the building was too far gone to be saved, but with good streams playing on each side the adjoining buildings were kept from the flames, with very little damage done to them.

The loss on building, stock and fixtures was about \$2,500, with \$1,500 insurance.

Mr. Gunderson has already begun the work of clearing the wreck and will rebuild at once.
