Editor Evening News.—On Sunday last we received a visit from Brother Edmund Ellsworth, who preached to us a good discourse upon the course which should be pursued by us as Latter-day Saints in order to obtain that happiness which we are continually seeking for. His audience was very attentive, and was undoubtedly much edified. In the evening, Elders Watkins and Charles White, of Brigham City, addressed the Saints, and endeavored to encourage them to go on with the good work in which they had started, and exhorted them to faithfulness in the performance of their duty.

On Monday, the Superintendent of Common Schools, Elder Watkins, spent the day with us in visiting our schools. There are three District Schools taught here, containing in all 130 scholars, and one Select School taught by Bro. George Osmond of Rich county. This school is composed of 35 scholars, all young men, who are very attentive and are making rapid advancement in many of the different branches of education. A good feeling prevailed in all the schools, and during our visit some suitable remarks were made which it is hoped will bring as good results as were wished for. The scholars were very attentive, cleanly and well clad.

We have had good times here this winter. Our evenings are occupied in attending lectures, quorum meetings, prayer meetings, singing schools, &c. The DESERET NEWS is well appreciated here, and is eagerly inquired after, as also your *Instructor* which is highly prized by our children.
