



## ROSS AND LEWIS ON FEBRUARY 5.

Wrestlers Agree to Meet on That Date at the New Grand Theater.

### THE ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT.

Signed by the Utah Boy and Sent to Lewis For His Signature—Latter Coming Soon.

Charley Ross and F. S. Lewis are matched for a wrestling match to take place on the evening of February 5th at the Grand Theater, Salt Lake City. Lewis, who was at one time the champion middleweight wrestler of the world, issued a challenge through the "News" to Ross. The latter at once accepted and stated the terms under which he would engage in the contest. The terms were entirely satisfactory to Lewis. Last evening the articles of agreement were drawn up, signed by Ross and mailed to Lewis for his signature.

It is expected that Lewis will leave Baker City, Or., at once for this city to complete his training for the event. Ross is already in fine shape, and believes he will have no trouble in defeating the challenger. A copy of the articles of agreement follows:

#### ARTICLE I.

We the undersigned, F. S. Lewis and Charley Ross, hereby agree to wrestle a bona fide wrestling match, catch-as-catch-can, at the Grand Theater, Salt Lake City, Utah, on the evening of February 5, 1904, match to be for one hundred and twenty dollars side bet, and net gate receipts, winner take all.

And it is further agreed, that match will be for best two out of three falls, no hold barred, otherwise governed by Police Gazette rules, referee to be named by the promoters.

In case of sickness or disability, this contract can be postponed on signed certificate from two practicing physicians.

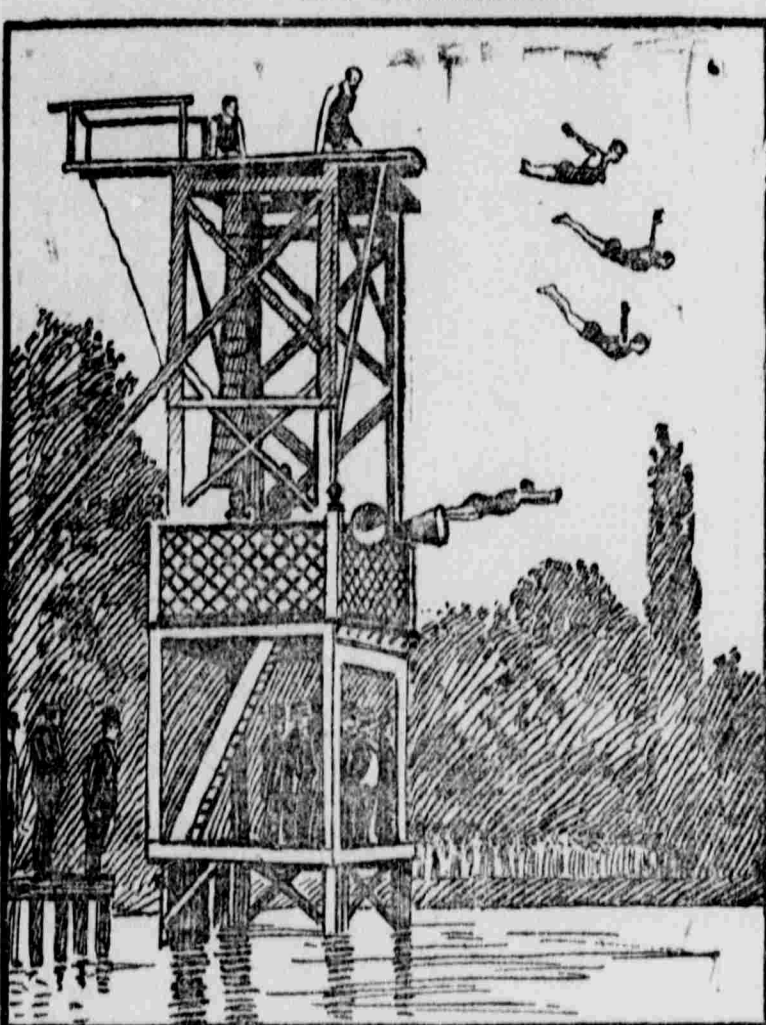

#### Schaefer Challenges the World.

New York, Jan. 19.—Jacob Schaefer, the American billiardist, now here, has published a letter, says a Herald dispatch, in which he challenges any billiard player in the world for two matches—one at 1000 points, the other at 2000 points, each match to be played at cushion caroms, 130 points, 20 points each night, the matches to be played with two and three-eighths inch balls on a five by ten table.

The blow looked low to the spectators, and the referee's decision awarding the bout to Carter was greeted with cries of "foul." Choynski was out nearly four minutes and appeared in great distress. The men were matched to fight fifteen rounds.

Last tonight Carter and Choynski were arrested charged with mutual assault. Eight other men, including seconds and referees and the managers of the club, were also arrested on charge of aiding and abetting a prize fight. Each was bailed in the sum of \$25.

#### The Case of Quick.

The last bulletin from President Herriman of the National commission says: "E. S. Quick, claimed by the New York Americans and traded to Toledo, does not belong to American leaguers, and is recommended to Salt Lake in this finding."

The attention of the commission was called to this case by Mr. Lucas, president of the Pacific National league, through Mr. Farrell, the secretary of the National association. They called attention to the fact that on the promulgated list of purchased players, filed by the commission in September, the name of E. S. Quick appeared. The fact that one C. H. Griffin had assured control of the Salt Lake franchise, that the purchase money on account of Quick be paid to him. This not being a dispute between two clubs, the matter was taken up by the entire commission. We find that this player has not been purchased by the New York American league club, and therefore direct the secretary of the commission to strike his name from the New York American list and place it on the Salt Lake reservation list.

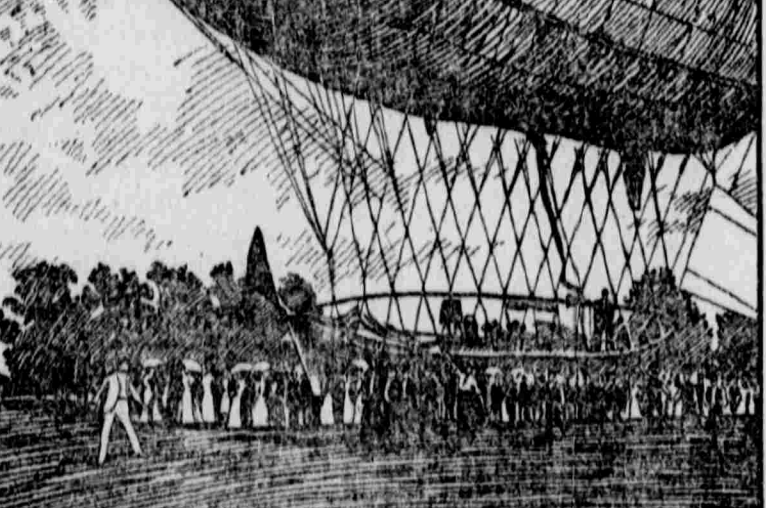

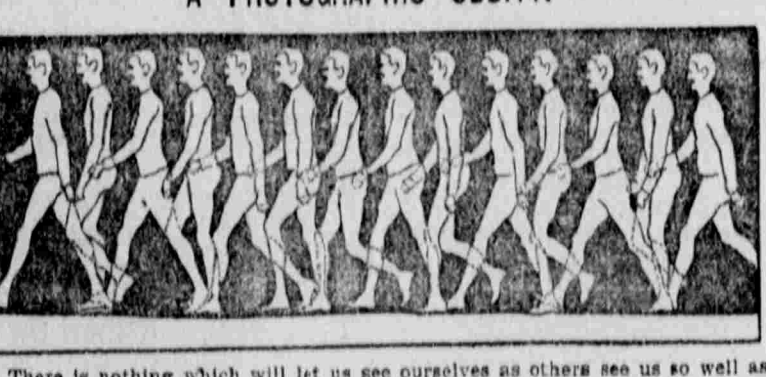

## OPPORTUNITY FOR ALL NEW STUDENTS

L. D. S. University Makes Provisions to Receive Graduates of Public Schools.

### TERM WILL OPEN FEBRUARY 1.

Latest Bulletin of the School Shows Attractive Array of Elementary, Advanced, and Business Courses.

The third quarterly bulletin of the Latter-day Saints' university, just from the press of the Deseret News, contains the announcements of the new classes to be organized 10 days hence for the benefit of beginning students.

The studies have been arranged for the accommodation of pupils who may graduate from the district schools this week, and who may be ready to take a high school, a normal or a business course thereafter.

The new courses will begin on Feb. 1, allowing one week for the students to rest and to investigate the facilities, the methods, and the work of the institution before they enter.

All graduates of the public schools, all parents who are investigating for the purpose of placing their sons and daughters in higher institutions, and all students that contemplate taking a course of higher study, here or elsewhere, are cordially welcome to visit the school and to see for themselves the work it is doing.

The idea in some way got abroad last winter that the L. D. S. university had no courses that eighth grade graduates could enter in midwinter. This idea is, however, apparently entirely erroneous. All such students will, it is stated, enter beginning classes at that time in such studies as beginning algebra, physical geography, advanced grammar, English classics, theology, etc., in the four-year high school courses, and in arithmetic, penmanship, grammar, shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping, telegraphy, correspondence, law, etc., in the business courses. Provision is made also to receive students into the mechanic and domestic arts departments in first year work, while many other classes are open to more advanced students, such as the subjects of botany, geology, chemistry, pedagogy, kindergarten theory and training, political economy, Roman history, higher economics, advanced work in accounting and commercial law, etc.

The courses follow closely the recommendations of the committees on secondary education appointed by the National Educational association, and are of a very high standard of efficiency. The registrar reports a large and constantly growing enrollment of about 1,100, the increase in the high school and normal departments being the most noticeable, with the business college, however, more than holding its own. Inquiry into the personnel of the teaching force in charge of the various classes and departments shows the presence of a faculty that is unequalled in high school lines of education in any western institution. #### SCULPTURE BY MACHINERY.

The accompanying illustration shows Auguste Bonet, the young Italian sculptor, at work on the machine which he has invented and which enables any one to carve busts and life size figures easily and accurately. The operation

of the machine is very simple. The sculptor guides a wooden pointer over the features of the model which it is desired to reproduce. The movement of the pointer controlling a steel drill, which cuts a replica of the original out of a block of marble. Thus it is a simple matter for every one to be his own sculptor.
