Hereafter the hranches of all evergreens will be gathered and after a process of steaming to extract the resinous matter will be ground into dry pilip, which may be shipped to any distance. It looks as though in time there will be absolutely so waste in any department of manufacture. Means of utilizing what has always been regarded as waste matter are being constantly discovered.


