FAMINE IN BRITISH AMERICA.

A CRY of distress comes from Red River Colony, on the Assinibion river, in the British American possessions; a cry for the necessaries of life. Parents and children are suffering for the want of food. Famine rages in the midst of fifteen thousand people, and unless the appeals now being made to the charitable throughout the country meet with a speedy and hearty response, there can be no doubt that horrors similar to those recently witnessed in the northern portion of Scandinavia, Eastern Prus is, and among the Arabs in Algiers, will be seen in the Red River Colony.

One-third of the inhabitants of the Red River Celony follow agricultural pursuits; about an equal number are hunters, who make semi-annual expeditions to regions where the buffalo in vast numbers are found. Upon these sources, alone—agriculture and hunting, -the colonists at Red River depend almost wholly for their food and clothing. But reverse and disaster have overtaken the people during the past season. Their crops have been entirely consumed by the grasshoppers, so that not a bushel of grain has been harvested in the entire colony; and the buffalo, having left their old pastures, their supply of meat and robes has also completely failed. The position of the people at Red River, it will be thus seen, is a fearful one. Situated far north, in a rigorous climate, with winter close upon them, they are absolutely dependent upon the sympathies of the charitable for the barest necessaries of life.

Public meetings, for the purpose of procuring aid for these unfortunate people, have been held in St. Paul, Minnesota, and appeals are now being made to the charitably disposed in various parts of the Union in aid of the suffering Colony. Food and other necessaries, to support at least 10,000 people for a period of six or seven months, have to be raised in a very short time, for the probabilities are that by November they may be walled in by 500 miles of snow, with no possible way of reaching them except by means of dog trains.

Contributions of money may be sent to the First National Bank, St. Paul, Minnesota, and flour and wheat to the care of Messrs. J. J. Hill & Co., St. Paul, Minn.

This is another startling sign of the times. Famine has now raged, within the last two or three years on the continents of Asia, Europe and Africa, and is now making itself visible on the Continent of America. On the Asiatic Continent, in Northern India, on the European Continent, in Eastern Prussia and Scandinavia, and among the Algierines in Africa.

In addition to these fearful visitations the world is being visited with earthquakes with greater frequency than ever, spreading death and destruction to an almost unparalleled extent. Then again the sea, in every direction is going beyond its bounds, adding to the wide spread terror and distress among the people. On every hand too, war with all its horrors is imminent. In Europe the greatest war of the age is expected with almost breathless anxiety. Never before probably, since the giant wars of Napoleon the First have preparations for war on such a gigantic scale being made as are now in progress.
