NEVADA HILLS
MAKES NEW STRIKE

Cuts Through Faulted Zone and
Proves Continuity of Nevada Hills Vein.

WHAT PRESIDENT RICE SAYS.

Company Will Proceed With Plans to
Build a Mill—Treatment
Methods.

President Windsor V. Rice has been
advised by wire of what he considers to
be very important developments in the
Nevada Hills mine. The message came
from Manager Webber, who has ad-
vised that in the cross cuts run to the
east on both the 150 and 200 levels
through a faulted country ore has been
encountered.

"There is a whole lot of significance
about this strike," said Mr. Rice today.
"By it, we have located the ore beyond
this faulted territory which leaves little
room for doubt that it continues on
to the full length of a claim, or about
2,000 feet. So, you see, we have got it
on both sides of this fault. It was on
the west side that the recent sulphide
strike was made; and the portion of the
mine from which the company has
drawn ore for market is the east side.
The Nevada Hills mine is undoubtedly
one of the big mines of Nevada. Plans
are now being laid to provide
milling facilities and for the purpose
of obtaining a better idea of the amount
of tonnage that can be depended on in
the future, an engineer is now on the
ground."

The best method of treatment of the
carbonate ores has been fully deter-
mined, but this cannot be made applica-
ble to the sulphide zone, so there are
some metallurgical details to be worked
out before the company is ready to
proceed with the construction of the
proposed plant.

NEW MAN AT NEWHOUSE.

T. R. Drummond to Succeed Supt. A.
D. Moffat, May 1.

Official announcement has been made
of the appointment of T. R. Drummond
as superintendent of the properties of the
Newhouse Mines & Smelters cor-
poration to succeed A. D. Moffat, whose
resignation was presented to Mr. New-
house several months ago. Mr. Drum-
mond comes from the Nipissing mines
at Cobalt, Ontario, but is not unknown
in Utah, as he has formerly worked
with the Utah Consolidated in Bing-
ham.

Although Mr. Moffat expressed a de-
sire to retire about the beginning of the
year, he was prevailed upon to con-
tinue with the company while longer
with the understanding that he would
be relieved not later than May 1. Mr.
Drummond is expected to reach Salt
Lake next week as he has turned the
responsibilities at the Nipissing mines
over to his successor, R. B. Watson,
formerly of the Shannon Copper com-
pany.

MILL TO BE BUILT.

Manager Burton of Utah-Arizona In-
structed to Go Ahead.

Lafayette G. Burton, general man-
ager of the Utah-Arizona properties in
the Weaver district, Arizona, expects
to leave for camp again tomorrow
night.

It was stated by President Heber S.
Cutler today, that Mr. Burton has in-
structions from the board of directors
to get ready for the construction of a
mill, the final unit of which will con-
sist of ten stamps.

In the meantime development work
is progressing steadily and, President
Cutler states, with very satisfactory
results.

Toole Citizens Satisfied With Proposi-
tion of Utah Con.

The Pine Canyon smelter meeting
held in the Toole city hall was one
of the best attended meetings ever held
in that place, the hall being too small
for the accommodation of those in at-
tendance. State Senator Peter Clegg
was the chairman, and County
Treasurer Edwin M. Orme secretary
of the meeting. Mr. C. R. McBride
read the proposal of the smelter com-
pany to the farmers, as was stated in
the transcript of the meeting. After a
thorough review of the written docu-
ment it was accepted by all the farm-
ers present as a satisfactory basis for
the smelter company to go ahead with
the building of the Pine canyon smel-
ter.

AT THE MEETING AT LAKE VIEW

on Friday evening the same conclusions
were reached by the farmers there.
And thus it is left with the smelter
company to make the move in the
matter.—Toole Transcript.

GREAT BEND STRIKE.

Advices from Goldfield indicate that
a recent strike has been made in the
property of the Goldfield Great
Bend which was promoted several years
ago by a syndicate of Salt Lake min-
ers. The mine has been made on the
350 foot level, the vein is two and
one-half feet in width and the face
yesterday, according to a private mes-
sage received this morning, the average
of the face was better than \$4.50 in gold
per ton. The stock is quoted 100 per
cent higher than it was a week ago.

LATE NEWS FROM
TINTIC DISTRICT

Mines Manager Allen Visits the
Centennial Eureka Mine and
Talks About Smelter.

NO. CLIFT MAKES SHIPMENT.

Contract On Contact Claim—Ore
Shipments of Week from Juab
County Camp.

Eureka, March 10.—Mines Manager
Allen of the United States Smelting,
Refining & Mining company, was in
the camp yesterday looking after the
company's affairs at the Centennial
Eureka mines. He stated that it
would be about two months before the
United States smelters at Bingham
Junction would be ready to receive
ore from the Tintic mines, as perhaps
30 days would be necessary to put the
big plant in condition for the treat-
ment of ore again.

When asked regarding a rumor of
a strike in the Deprezin ground which
is being developed by the Centennial
Eureka company, under bond and
lease, he said that no strike had been
made, but that there was a very
favorable change in the workings,
which are no doubt nearing the ore.
This ground lies to the west of the
Centennial Eureka claims. It is owned
by Capt. Hugo Deprezin.

A meeting of the Iron Hat Mining
company was held in Salt Lake Mon-
day, Dr. Harvill, William Hoffman
and C. E. Hulsh of Eureka attending
the meeting. A resolution was adopt-
ed changing the general place of busi-
ness of the company from Salt Lake
to the Tintic district. The company
secretary to fill the vacancy caused
by the resignation of N. A. Robert-
son. It is the intention of the com-
pany to take up the development of
this property in East Tintic at an early
date, which consists of four claims,
upon which some work was done last
fall.

Another assessment, number 10, has
been levied by the McKinley Mining
company and is delinquent May 10,
and the date of sale is June 11.

B. H. Bullock came up from Provo
today for the purpose of letting a con-
tract for the purpose of tunneling at the
Contact claim of the Montreal group
in East Tintic. Upon this ground
there is already a tunnel in 150 feet,
which will be extended 100 feet fur-
ther.

The North Clift at Silver City sent
out a carload of ore as a trial ship-
ment this week. The lot ran 35 lbs
per ton, 20 ounces in silver and 15
per cent iron.

Some of the directors of the Selma
Mining company, including Walter
Poulton and L. C. Peterson, were out
from Salt Lake Wednesday and visited
the property in North Tintic. It is
stated that preparations are under way
for the resumption of development
work, as the Selma has a very good
showing, considering the amount of
work done. The property is equipped
with an electric drill and perhaps an
electric hoist will be installed soon.

Another promising property in North
Tintic is the White Star. B. Rich
of Salt Lake returned to his home
Thursday after visiting the prop-
erty. He is accompanied by an engineer.
If Mr. Rich is successful in his ef-
forts to place a block of stock, a force
of men will be put to work on devel-
opments.

A derrick engine will be installed on
the 1,000-level at the Little Chief for
the purpose of deepening the shaft
without interfering with the develop-
ment work now in progress. The main
shaft will be dropped from 300 to 400
feet.

The shipments of ore from Tintic
for the past week amounted to 3,300
tons, the properties shipping being as
follows: Centennial Eureka, 45;
Bullion Beck, 5; Eureka Hill, 1; North
Clift, 1.
