The committee on license reported on the matter of the communication of the Pacific Express company, recom-mending that the license fee be reduced from \$25 a year to \$15, and presenting a bill for amending the ordinance, was was passed.

Chairman Bott of the electric light committee reported \$2.542.74 expended to date on the electric power plant site, and that work had been suspended for

and that work had been suspended for the reason that work could not now be prosecuted to advantage. Chairman Miller of the committee on public grounds and city property, re-ported buying 5.98 acres of ground near Slate canyon for \$90 and that he had taken an option on 4.83 acres for \$100, to be used for depositing refuse from the city and for a road to the city gravel beds. The report was adopted and \$190 was appropriated for the pur-pose of paying for the land.
