There is some confusion in local wireless telegraphic circles owing to the uncertain conduct of two amateur outfits in the lower part of the city. These have been started up by two boys who through their ignorance of the regular conversational code are confusing, not only themselves but other local wireless plants whose sys-tem of operation is based on orthodo:: methods. Manager McNicol of the Postal Telegraph company, who is an expert, and has a good establishment of his own, will hunt up these young scientists, and persuade them to learn the code, so that they can operate their plants intelligently, because if they do not, they will continue to confuse not only themselves but every other plant in this vicinity. Where the Morse code is learned, owners and operators of wireless plants can readily keep from getting themselves mixed up and in-terfering with others.

The figure given may be a little less than the actual amount, or perhaps a little in excess; but not far distant from the real figure, one way or the other.

other. In other words, the total wool clip in this state this year will approximate nearly 14.600,600 pounds. The price paid for wool has ranged from 14 to 20 cents on an average; in some instances, where the clip was contracted before the high prices began to figure in the season's clip, wool was sold as low as 12 cents the pound. Then again, in a few sporadic instances, the price went up as high as 23 and 24 cents a pound, one clip bringing as high as 25 cents. But these were exceptional prices, and But these were exceptional prices, and the average may be safely figured at about 18 cents a pound, or a round \$2,500,000 for the wool clip of this state
