MEN UNABLE TO HANDLE IT.

Switching Crews After Working Day And Night Asked for Help and Simply Quit,

The tremendous rush that has been going west over both the Union Pacific and the Rio Grande during the past 10 days has had the effect of precipitating a serious strike on the Southern Paciffic between Ogden and Reno, among the switchmen, switch engineers and firemen.

Owing to the heavy colonist travel west and the extra freight and passenger business incident to the washouts on the Santa Fe, the number of trains that have been handled on the two systems has been something ap pailing.
