denies that Russia is intriguing with Afghanistan and says: "Had Russia wished to create difficulties for England, she would have liber-ated Abdul Rhaman, the pretender to the Afghan throne, whom, on the contrary, she is watching in Samarcand, and is preventing his flight to Afghanistan."

The Agence Russe concludes as follows:-"The events at Cabul and in the Torcoman territories tend to prove the necessity of a good understanding between England and Russia."

The semi-official North German Gazette says: The importance of the political relations between Germany and Austria having continued to increase the last few months, it was therefore an absolute necessity that the chancellor should be assured of the permanence of the friendly relations.
