Hayer Baskin Removes Superintendent of Waterworks Ryan.

D. S. GRIFFIN SUCCEEDS HIM.

Henry Johnson Steps Into Gaily's Shoes—City Warrants in Payment of Taxes.

The municipal mill wheels were set in motion last night by Commissioner Baskin moving that Commissioner Ryan be removed from the office of superintendent of waterworks. The motion carried. On roll call the following members responded: Bell, Hardy, Johnson, Lawson, Hays, Bell, Helms, Simmons.

THE PROCEEDINGS.

Followed moved that the Council sit as a board of equalization and review the sewer assessment on Fifth East street sewer on Thursday, August 17, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Carried.

STREET SUPERVISOR HINES SUGGESTED THE EMPLOYMENT OF FIVE MEN TO CUT AND REMOVE WEEDS ON THE HIGHWAY.

There was some objection to this because it was not in the interest of the city.

JOHN BULLARD'S REPORT.

A report of the joint city and county polling was received and filed. The report shows that the city and county polling was held on August 10, 1905.

DAVIS COUNTY APPEAL.

A petition was received from the mayor of Davis county, praying on behalf of the county court, that the road from the Hot Springs south to Hot Lake City and within the corporate limits be repaired, same being in a dangerous condition.

RYAN REMOVED.

The following communication was received from the Mayor of Salt Lake City to the Council:

I hereby appoint Mr. D. S. Griffin as superintendent of waterworks in the place of Mr. Ryan, removed from office on August 11, 1905.

Henry Johnson moved that the Mayor be authorized to remove Ryan from office and appoint Griffin in his place.

Johnson believed that the Mayor was a good man, but he thought the Mayor was acting hastily in the matter. He didn't believe in taking newspaper accounts for everything.

Johnson thought the Council should be consulted on the question.

It was decided that the Mayor's communication be referred to the Council on Monday next.

Johnson believed the removal was a wise step, but he was in a quibbling way in making the matter. He was pretty well acquainted with the particulars of the case.

High advised immediate action; he did not think it wise to allow the department to be turned over to Ryan's assistant for even a single day.

Johnson's motion was then put and lost.

Johnson then took occasion to assure the Mayor in the strongest language he could command for removing Ryan without consulting the Council.

Johnson moved that the Mayor's communication be referred back for "more light" and "more reason."

Johnson's motion was then put and lost.

Johnson moved as a substitute, that the appointment of Mr. Griffin be confirmed.

Johnson's substitute motion was not entertained whereupon Johnson moved the matter be referred to the city attorney for an opinion as to the legality of the removal and the power of the chief executive to remove an appointive officer summarily.

Johnson said all of the talk being indulged in was only for delay because they wanted to let Ryan down quietly.

Johnson's substitute then carried on the following vote:

Ayes—Lindbergh, Beersley, Bell, Evans, Horn, Kelly, Math, Simmons.

Noes—Johnson, Hardy, Helms, Lawson, Hays.

JOHN BULLARD'S REPORT.

Remember Johnson again announced the appointment by him of Mr. Brown as Deputy Tax Collector, vice Lindbergh resigned.

The appointment was confirmed on a vote of twelve to one.
