Tailor Whitman Tells Ins and **Outs of Married** Life.

WIFE IS OF NEGRO DESCENT

Roebling Construction Company Files Counterclaim in Suit for \$1,000 By Former Superintendent.

Caswell Whitman today filed answer In the Third district court in the somewhat sensational action brought against him for divorce by his wife, Inez Gomez Whitman, Whitman denies in his answer that the couple were married on Feb. 2, 1904, at Birmingham, Ala., as alleged in the complaint, but avers that they were married at the city named on Feb. 1 1903. Whitman admits that he is by occupation a tailor, but denies hi wife's allegation that he is capable of earning \$8 per day, and states that \$2, or \$2,50, has been for him a fair sized wage. He denies, too, that since June 25, 1907, he has failed to sup ply his wife with the necessaries of life, or that she was dependent upor her relatives for support. Defendant upon her relatives for support. Defendant alleges that he provided for his wife all during the year 1907, but that in the month of February, 1908, she refused to live with him and has ever since lived separate and apart from him against his will and inclin-tion ation

WAS ON THE STREET.

In the complaint of plaintiff, it is alleged as a second cause of action that Whitman compelled his wife to solicit Whitman compelled his wife to solleit money from men she might meet on the street in order to support defend-ant, and that during the month of February, 1908, defendant beat and struck the plaintiff and blackened her eyes and threatened to kill her, and accusing her of being a negro. HIS WIFE INSANE.

Parker B. Cady Asks Court for Decree Of Divorce.

Parker B. Cady today filed sult in the Third district court for divorce from his wife. Amelia Cady. The complaint sets forth that the couple were married at Lowell, Mass., Nov. 1. 1882; that there are no minor children as the result of the union; that for more than five years past the de-fendant was adjudged insane by the constituted authorities of Rhode Jaland, namely, on Feb. 7, 1900, and she was committed to the insane asy-lum at Pawtuckett on the court's further alloges she was committed to the insane asy-lum at Pawtuckett on the court's order. The complaint further alleges that defendant is suffering from a disease known as dementia praecox, accompanied by progressive dementia, and that her insanity is both perman-ent and incurable. Plaintiff claims he has always provided defendant with the best of care and medical skill since their marriage, and prays for a dissolution of the bonds of matrimony existing between them. Judge Ritchle, upon reading the verified complaint in the above action, appointed A. E. Christensen as guar-dian ad litem for Amelia Cady, the defendant.
