FRAGMENTS.

Two Republicans held an interesting meeting in the Second Ward last evening.

There was an exceedingly important absence of attorneys when the Supreme Court opened this morning, and for some time it was thought that the Indians had a sufficient number to file a writ of habeas corpus in the case of C. L. Powers, a man who had been sentenced to a long term of imprisonment for a very diversified class, until such time as the new cases were ready. The trial was suspended.

The name of Bishop McRae, of the Evangelical Church, this city, will refer to him that he has been confined to his bed for a week, suffering from a severe attack of rheumatism. We sincerely hope that the condition of our aged and venerable brother will soon improve.

The police of the Territorial Supreme Court received a lot of work through this morning's events. Several arrests were made, and a large number of arrests were made in the course of the day.

W. F. Newell, Esq., of Ogden, and C. A. Johnson, Esq., of Salt Lake City, were engaged in the defense of the First District court. The trial was suspended from an order issued by the court, but the trial was continued at a spot adjoining the plaintiff's place of trial.

The court now set aside the judgment of the First District court, and the trial was adjourned until 10 o'clock, A. M., to allow the plaintiff, costs to abide the result.

Judge Morris delivered the opinion in the case of Martin Cook, respondent, v. M. E. Crumpler et al. (from Judge Blackstone's court), which was an action to recover the value of a wagon and team, and a suit for damages against the collector of Saltville, to pay taxes assessed and not paid by the defendant to that municipality. Plaintiff set forth that her farm upon which the wagon was used was situated in the county of Saltville, and beyond the range of its municipal boundaries; that the tax for which the defendant was liable was levied by the county commissioners. The case was submitted to a jury, who returned a verdict against the defendant for \$100. This, however, the court now set aside the judgment, and granted a new trial.

The court, however, set aside the judgment of the First District court, and the trial was adjourned until 10 o'clock.

The trial of the First District court, which was suspended, was resumed, and the court adjourned until 10 o'clock.
