LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Masquerades.—A growing practice in our community is the fashionable masquerade. At one time it was entirely unknown among the Latter-day Saints, but with the adoption of the customs and follies of Babylon, of late years our young people have become infatuated with the excitement of "the gay mask ball," and in various parts of this city we are sorry to say many things are of too frequent occurrence. We cannot find language sufficient to deprecate this increasing evil. The purpose for which the masquerade was inaugurated are intrinsically sinful. The corrupt aristocracy of Europe invented this species of amusement as a means to accomplish their schemes of wickedness, and the same spirit has animated their advent into this country and into our midst. The vile acts committed at such places are so numerous and shameful that we have neither time, space, nor desire to refer to them, but trust that a word of counsel will be sufficient to warn the Saints against the danger of permitting their children to attend places where wickedness is liable to creep in and corrupt their morals.

That it is an insidious desire for pleasure that induces our young people to get up private and select balls of this character, we believe, but that it is dangerous to copy the follies of the world in the slightest degree, and that bad will always lead to worse we equally believe. The honest need no mask either for their faces or their actions, but men choose darkness rather than light whenever their deeds are evil.

Bereavement.—Brother S. K. Gifford, writing from Springdale, Kane County, and mentioning some items in connection with that section of country, states that Brother and Sister Beal have lost three children by diphtheria, and have four more sick. We, in common with the many friends of the bereaved family, sympathize and condole with them, and trust that the hand of affliction which has rested so heavily upon them may be speedily removed.

Reported Stroke.—A supposed case of stroke in the 5th Ward is reported. The victim, a child, went to bed Saturday night apparently well, but next morning was seized with convulsions and expired. That this is a genuine case of the dreadful affliction, though several have so expressed themselves, there is room for doubt, it being rather early in the season to expect such things, though the fact that they are not due to the heat of the sun alone, partially sustains the supposition. That the coming season will be of unusual intensity in this respect, is generally believed, so it is now time to prepare for the coming of the scourge.

Manuscript Alphabets.—A set of ancient alphabets done in pen and ink and illuminated in water colors by Brother Daniel Graves, of Provo City, has been added to the Deseret Museum. These alphabets were copied from rare works and manuscripts in the British Museum of London. They are very curious and give evidence of much patience in execution and erudition in compilation; the borders are illuminated in water colors and embellished with devices of much interest by the artist. It is the intention of the Curator of the Museum to have these alphabets bound up with other manuscripts now in the cabinets of the Museum.

He believes they have not been in vain, since many hundreds of mulberry trees are being set out, and many people are going into silkworm raising.
