## NEW COMPLAINTS.

#### Were Filed Today Against Young Arthur Brown.

The two complaints filed by Asst. County Atty. Hanson against Arthur Brown charging him with forgery and uttering forged instruments were dismissed by Judge Whitaker of the city court yesterday afternoon upon motion of Mr. Hanson. A motion to quash the warrants issued on the complaints was made by Attys, Kinney & Wilson yesterday morning on the ground that the complaints were not sworn to before a magistrate as required by law. In asking that the complaints be dismissed the assistant county attorney practically admitted the point rais-ed by the attorneys for Brown. Two new complaints were issued, however. containing the same facts and they were sworn to before Judge Whitaket were sworn to before Judge Whitaker personally so that the point can not again be raised. New warrants were issued and Brown was rearrested by Deputy Sheriff Joe Sharp and is still in the county jall where he was com-mitted yesterday morning by Judge Whitaker. He will be arraigned on Thursday morning before Judge Whit-Thursday morning before Judge Whit-nker and will probably enter his plea to the charges against him.
