The Creation Tonight—Howard Atheneum—Sea of Ice—Frank Merrill on Utah Artists in the East—Mr. Brady and His Freaks—Late Amusement Notes.

The immortal Creation, composed in the years 1797 and 1798 by Haydn, and rendered since that time in every land where music holds sway, will be given in the Salt Lake Theater tonight by the Choral Society. There will be 250 voices in the chorus, an orchestra of 20, and Messrs. Stephens, Haddell and Peterson are the heads of the affair, while the best known of our local soloists, including Mrs. Plummer, Miss Winsten, Mrs. Giesse, Mrs. Haynes, and Mr. Kuehn sing the solo parts. Should there be any funds realized from the presentation, they will go towards purchasing stock for the Choral Society in the proposed railway to Deep Creek, and this fact ought to draw many to when the announcement of an oratorio would possess little attraction.

The Creation is the sublime story of the birth of our world, set to music—a theme surely worthy of Haydn's genius. The biblical narrative and the poetic form are both employed, and the words themselves are as beautiful as the music. A representation of the orchestra is the opening motive. This is followed by a bass recitative from the lips of the angel Raphael—"In the beginning God created the heaven and earth." A beautiful chorus then takes up the theme, "And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters, and God said let there be light and there was light." Uriel (soprano), and Gabriel (soprano), both announce the commandments of Jehovah, that set apart and finish the six days work, and the choruses are descriptive of the appearance of earth at the close of each day. The whole concludes with the creation of man and the beautiful duet by Adam and Eve is one of the gems of the work. The words will be printed in full in the evening's program, and they will be found to afford much pleasure to lovers of poetry as the music will to those who attend for the sake of the grand harmonies and melodies with which the work abounds.
