The amended petition of the Salt take Commercial club traffic bureau, the interstate commerce commission. has been mailed for filing with the ommission at Washington, D. C. The elition is a very lengthy one, and contains a setting forth of grievances of the bureau, followed by an itemized statement of the changes requested by that organization to be made in the existing freight rate schedule from eastern points to Utah common points. THE CHARGES.

The complaint recounts the organiza-The complaint recounts the organiza-tion of the bureau in Salt Lake City, and its representation of like organiza-iions in Ogden and Provo, and of citi-zens and business men in all the cities named, and the petition forwarded to the president of the United States by that organization, bearing the signa-iures of more than 3,000 citizens, asking for relief from discriminatory rates. The complaint charges "arbitrary, op-pressive and exceptional methods in ranscortation rate-making, especially pressive and exceptional methods in iransportation rate-making, especially calculated to promote the growth and prosperity of San Francisco and other titles on the Pacific coast and to pro-duce and maintain an opposite con-dition of commercial servitude and dis-tress for the citles of the State of

Itah. The rates charged are pronounced as "unjust, unreasonable and, discrimina-tive for the extent of the service performed and also in comparison with the charges now assessed between much more widely separated points and involving much greater service through the Utah cities."

COAST CITES' PRIVILEGES. The above are a few of the instances

of discrimination on westbound freight. A table is also given in the complaint, showing that the coast cities enjoy greater privileges in shipping east than those of the intermountain territory,

The complaint also attacks the pas-senger rates charged by the railroads, claiming that the transportation rates now charged between Ogden. Salt Lake City and Provo, Denver, Portland, Om-aha, San Francisco and Los Angeles, in both directions are unjust, excessive, and unreasonable. The complaint sets forth the statement that "the through passenger transportation rates of far should justly and reasonably be not in excess of 2% cents per mile, based upon the short line mileage. as follows: That your petitioner fully believes and therefore alleges that a secret agreement exists between the Southern Pacific railway, the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad com-pany, the Oregon Railroad & Naviga-tion company and the Oregon Short tion company and the Oregon Short Line Rallway company, for the parti-tion of traffic territory, with a result-ing division of freight and passenger traffic between points in the states of California and Oregon and the cilies of Ogden, Salt Lake City, Provo and other points in the State of Utah and under which competition for such traf-fic is virtually eliminated and the transportation service impaired, to the great detriment of the commercial in-terest of your petitioner and the pub-lic generally and in violation of sald fifth section of the said act. Wherefore, complainant prays that fifth section of the said act. Wherefore, complainant prays that the most complete investigation of each and every grievance herein before complained of be made and that de-fendants may be severally required to answer the charges herein; that after due hearing and investigation an order be made commanding said defendants be made commanding said defendants, and each of them, to cease and desist from the aforesaid violations of the and each the aforesaid violations of the said aot to regulate commerce and to publish and put in force and apply as maxima in future to the transportation of all classes of freight and the com-modities named herein, between the shipping and destination points named in the foregoing paragraphs hereof, in lieu of the rates mamed in said para-graphs, such other rates as the com-mission may deem reasonable and just. Your petitioner and complanant fur-ther prays that said defendants, and each of them, by appropriate order, or commanded to cease and desist from the aforesaid violations of said act re-lating to passenger transportation lating to passenger transportation rates as alleged herein, and that each rates as alleged herein, and that each of them be required to publish and put in force such passenger transpor-tation rates between the points afore-said as will be just and reasonable. AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS.

An instance of the discrimination thown is cited in the complaint in the case of agricultural implements, such case of agricultural implements, such as reapers, mowers, harvesters, etc., in car lois between Chicago and Utah points. It is set forth that the rate on these articles is now \$1.33, while the rate to San Francisco on the same articles is only \$1.25. The bureau asks that a rate of 96 cents per 100 pounds be given to Utah common points on the agricultural implements named. The rate on such articles from Missis-sippi river points is \$1.25½ and from the Missouri river \$1.03. From the Mississippi to San Francisco it is \$1.20; from the Missouri river, the same.
