Mercur, March 31 .-- An Italian named Peter Caldo, or Chaido, committed sui-ride today by jumping into an open shaft 150 deep on Rover's flat, about mile and a half from town. ANOTHER TRIP FOR UTAH TEAM.

Colorado College Wants Dual Newly Adopted Rules Bring Pleas- The Final Roll Call Held at New Meet on the 28th of

It in Return for Meet Held Here Three Years Ago With Same Team.

The Utah track team may make two trips to Colorado this year. The possibility for a second trip comes in the shape of a letter from Capt. Painter of the Colorado College track team, who was in a dual meet with Utah three years ago in this city.

Capt. Painter makes an informal suggestion that it would be a fine thing to have Maddock and his men come over for a dual meet on April 28. On that day a Colorado high school meet is held on the Colorado College campus, in the afternoon. Capt. Painter's suggestion is that the Utah team come over for a meet in the morning, and then assist in acting as officials for the high school meet in the afternoon. The attraction of the double meet, he argues, would fill Colorado Springs with fans from Denver, who would make the trip pay, as a financial proposition. Coach Maddock said this morning that he expected to hear officially on the matter right way, and if a formal proposition, with a gaurantee, li made, he will take his men over.

"The meet will do us a lot of good," he said, "as it will give us a line on a very fast Colorado bunch. What Fuzzy Moore can do against Painter is a question on which a number of points depends, while it is advisable all around to have a definite idea of our comparative strengts. with Celerade College before going to the

Three weeks will intervene between the date of the Colorado College meet and the conference meet, Capt, Painter was de-feated here by Hoddie Whitney in the sprints three years ago, and ever since has wished for a return dual meet at Colorado Springs.

Death Rate Lessened While Punting And not Line Plunging Will Be the Rule.

Chicago, April 2.- New rules adopted by received with favor at the University of Chicago yesterday. Sentiment strengly in many of the athletes and athletic authorities, while not a few of the faculty said they believed the majority of the evils of the game now would be obliterated. Faster football, more open play, perhaps a more resourceful game, in which punting and open field running will tend to produce more sensational fea-tures than before, together with a lessering of the "death rate" and minor injuries, it is believed, will result from the changes made by the committe. changes made by the committee.

"I believe the changes will be beneficial, said Dr. J. E. Kayeroft, the director of athletics. "The ten yards to be gained instead of five, will be an interesting experiment, and should, on the whole, tend to eliminate close play and constant line plunging. The regulation on hurdling and tackling below the knees ought to result in a reduction of injuries. "One notable result is likely to be a greater amount of punting. Spectators like to see the ball shift back and forth, and the opening of the game in this manner, it seems to me, win tend to make it more popular than before. I do not believe the game will be harmed seriously, though, perhaps there are some minor points that could be improved upon.

THE NEW RULES.

THE NEW RULES New York, April 1 .- The American in-Asw 10fk, April 1.—The American in-tercollegiate football rules committee, a consolidation of the old football rules committee and the representatives of col-leges who attended the recent conferences on football reform held in this city, final-ly adopted today the new playing rules-ter 1996.

The committee has

TEN YARDS IN THREE DOWNS. One of the principal changes doubles the distance to be gained on three downs. one of the principal changes doubted the distance to be gained on three downs, ten yards now being required of the team on the offense instead of five, as here-tofore. Forward passes are to be allowed, and whenever a forward passe crosses the goal line it shall count as a touchback. Reforms in methods of tackling, holding and interference have been provided, and the penalties for fouls have been severely stiffened. Six men only are to be on the line of scrimmage. A central board of control is to pass upon the competency of all game officials. More power is given to the game officials and it is provided that there shall be a referee, two umptices and a linesman in all games of first importance.

CAMP AND REID EDITORS.
