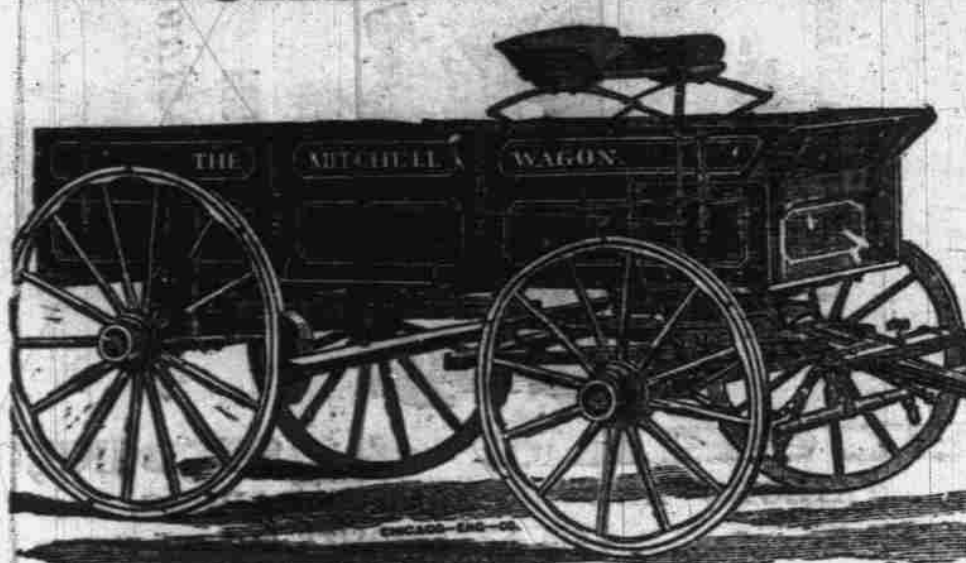
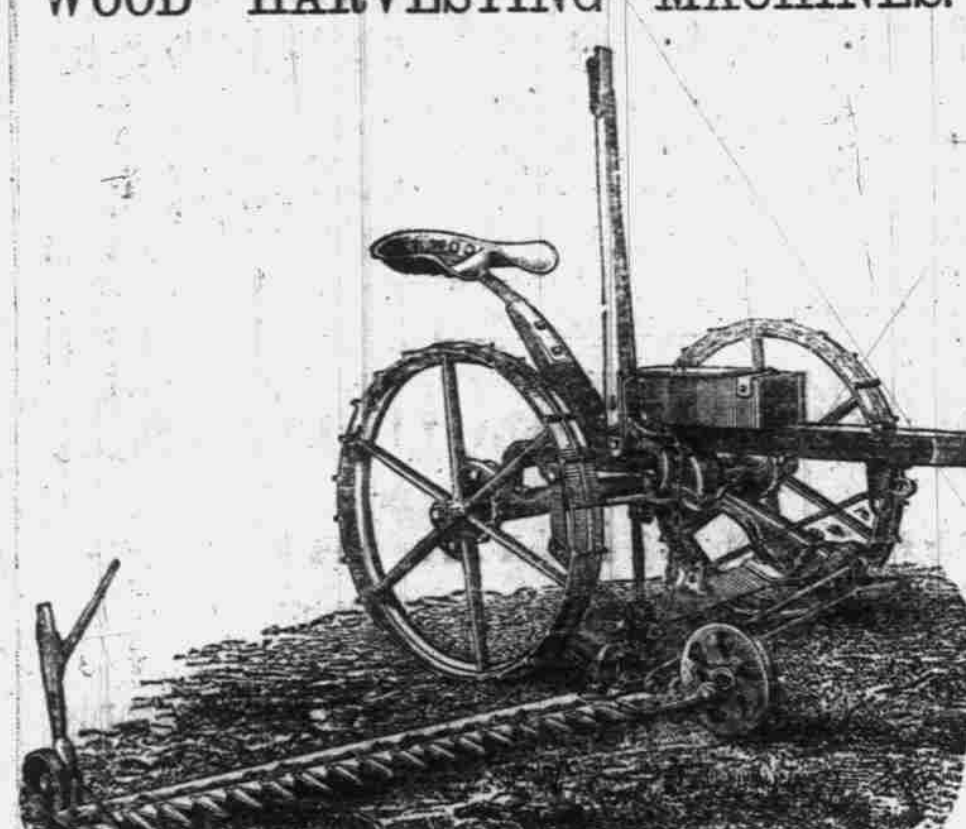

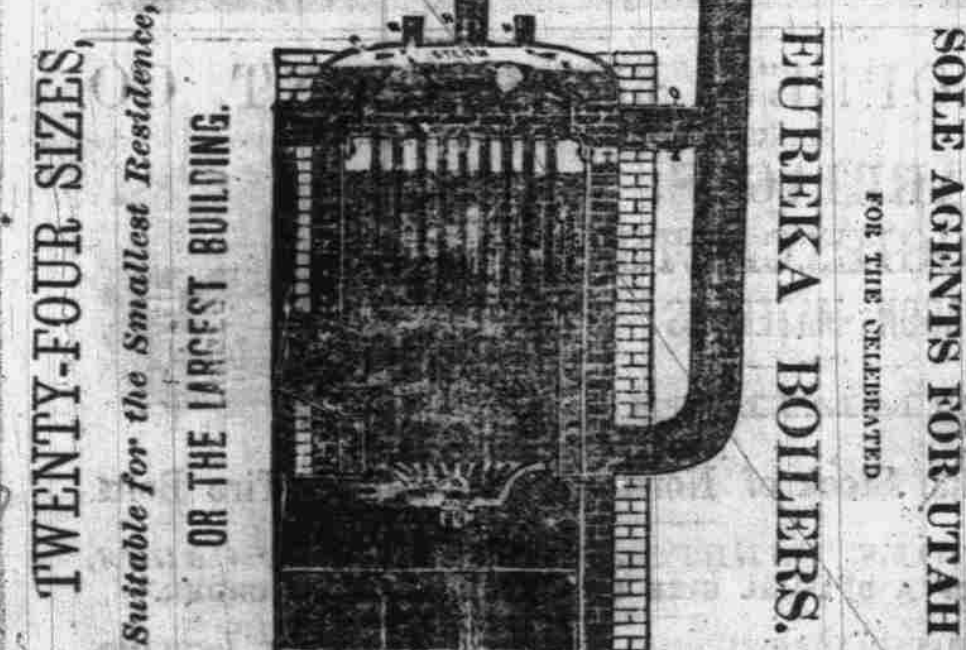

Sunday, July 20th.

1728—Vitus Behring discovered the Strait between America and Asia.

1823—The Church printing office in Independence, Jackson Co., Mo., was destroyed by fire.
