

## VAILE ENTERS STRONG DENIAL

Says E. H. Harriman Has Not Acquired Control in Rio Grande.

### TRACKAGE AGREEMENT LIKELY

Such, However, He Declares, Is the Only Relationship Which May Have Started Rumors.

According to a Denver dispatch, J. F. Vaile, general counsel for the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, has made an official denial of reports that E. H. Harriman has acquired a controlling interest in the Denver & Rio Grande. Mr. Vaile has just returned to Denver from New York, where he had several conferences with George Gould, head of the road, and President E. T. Jeffery, and says there will be no changes in the directorate at the annual meeting in October which will indicate a change of control of the company. There may be trackage agreements between the Gould and Harriman lines, and this has given rise to the report that the Gould and Harriman interests have offered a compromise deal with D. B. Moffatt, in order to prevent the construction of the road owned by the latter into Salt Lake City. It is said the terms of the compromise include the building of a branch from Wamsutter, Wyo., to the Moffatt terminal, with the plan to run through trains over the Moffatt road through Denver. The Rio Grande would, in carrying out the proposed plan, build from Dotsero to the Moffatt terminal, running all through trains over this and the Moffatt road. Gould and Harriman are reported to be planning to finance the Moffatt tunnel and take 49 per cent of the bonds issued for it.

### RAILROAD TO BE SOLD.

Insolvent Alaska Central Will Pass to Control of Bondholders.

Seattle, Wash., July 28.—According to the Times the insolvent Alaska Central railroad, when it is sold by order of court this fall, will become the property of the bondholders, among whom is J. Pierpont Morgan, the principal factor in the Copper River & Northwestern railroad, in construction of which 3,000 men are now at work. The Alaska Central is projected to run from Seward, on the coast, to the Yukon river, and there are large coal fields along the route. Fifty-three miles have been built, but are not being operated.

### TALKS TO RETAILERS.

J. R. Newberry Says Many Merchants Do Not Know Good Methods.

At a meeting held last night of the Salt Lake Retail Merchants' association, J. R. Newberry, a prominent merchant of Los Angeles and president of the National Retail Merchants' association, delivered an interesting address on general trade topics. He told the merchants that 40 per cent of the average trade was in five articles, sugar, packinghouse products, coal oil, potatoes and flour. He said in part:

"There has been an awakening among the retail grocery merchants and they have begun to realize that they are of some importance in this world. There is still room for considerable education among the retail merchants on the best methods of conducting their stores and making their business a paying proposition."

"Thousands of men are in the retail grocery business who should be planting corn," said Mr. Newberry. "The large number of failures in the business should not exist, but they do, and there is a reason for it. The retail man does not know how to sell his goods for, and for this reason we men of the Pacific coast have asked that the manufacturers set the price at which goods can be sold to the consumer."

Mr. Newberry will attend the convention at Logan today and tomorrow.
