AMERICAN HORSES GOING TO ENGLAND

New York, Jan. 31.—The English racing season, which begins early in the spring, will attract wide attention in America, and the large number of American horses which will participate. The dependence of racing in various states has resulted in making the American breeds the most popular.

The English horses, which were shipped to England last year, are now in full training, and the sport is unhampered, where the sport is unhampered.

Among the prominent owners who have sent horses to England are James Keene, Arthur Belmont, Harry Payne, Whitney, while scores of young horses purchased here by British sportsmen will make their appearance at the races.

Cold and Prisselton, two unbeaten horses, head the long list of American racers now preparing for the races on the other side. Other well known animals include Bailey, Farley, and Diana Ken, Suffragette, Wedding Bells, Sir Martin, which will try for the Derby by his English owner, Watson, Melrose, Hallie Wolf.

That the English handicker has a high estimate of the American-bred runners is evident from the fact that that Cold, Farley, and Diana Ken, all three are now in their engagements pounds more than Liangtan, and Your Majesty, reckoned the best English horses of last year.

While the English stake races have started in the American Invading squad. These include, besides the Derby, the great English classic, the Ascot gold cup, the Doncaster handicaps, the Harberian plate, the Metropolitan stakes, the Liverpool cup, the Great Surrey handicap, the Victoria cup, the Eclipse stakes, and the Jockey club stakes.
