## BY TELEGRAPH.

THE CONDITION OF AFFAIRS IN VIR-  
GINIA.

CHICAGO, 8.—The Inter-Ocean  
Washington special says: Stillson  
Hutchins has ceased to boast and  
begun to plead. This morning in  
the Post he writes from Virginia as  
follows: The readjuster's party of  
Virginia met in convention at Rich-  
mond yesterday, and earnestly en-  
dorsed the democratic national  
ticket but nominated a full indepen-  
dent set of presidential electors to  
be voted for next November. This  
means in effect that the regular de-  
mocrats of the State will vote for  
one Hancock Electoral ticket, the  
readjuster another Hancock elector-  
al ticket and the republicans for one  
Garfield electoral ticket, leaving the  
latter to carry the State and Garfield  
to secure his electoral vote. There  
is a large democratic majority in  
Virginia, but it cannot be divided  
and remain a majority. If the two  
contending factions of the Democra-  
cy, the conservatives and readjusters,  
insist upon running separate Han-  
cock tickets Garfield will carry the  
State and 11 electoral votes. A  
remedy for this threatened evil  
must be found at once.

Results of the Indiana Campaign.

It is evidently the purpose of In-  
diana republicans to conduct the  
campaign largely on the party  
and unheeded decision of the Su-  
preme Court of that State on the  
constitutional amendments. The  
decision itself furnishes a basis for  
a vigorous campaign in which the  
utter disregard of law and common  
honesty of the democratic justices  
will appear.

Census Figures.

The census of St. Louis has been  
completed. The total population is  
\$40,000. The first Dispatch of the  
city last evening, only declared  
both the census of 1870 and the  
city directory have been gross  
frauds.

The population of Cook County  
will reach 900,000, giving the coun-  
ty one and perhaps two more Con-  
gressmen. Four more judges of the  
Superior Court, and eight more legisla-  
tors.

Brady's Bluffs.

New York, 8.—There was consid-  
erable fluctuation in prices of bread-  
stuffs on the Exchange today, the  
advance in wheat being from  
two to three cents a bushel,  
the market closing feverish. Flour  
was from 10 to 15 cents higher, and  
corn was lower. The advance in  
wheat and flour was attributed to  
the unfavorable reports from official  
sources. In the west these dis-  
patches say that the outlook for  
spring wheat in Iowa, Minnesota  
and Wisconsin is decidedly unfavor-  
able.

Arrested and Committed.

Jerome and Patchell, accused of  
getting possession of bonds belong-  
ing to Bryson, Ives & Co., were ar-  
ranged to-day and an examination  
set for this afternoon. They claim  
to have good defenses. Subsequently  
Judge Duffy examined the prison-  
ers on charge of grand larceny and  
they were committed for trial. The  
securities were delivered to Mr. Ives.

Tanner's Trial.

At 2 o'clock this morning, Dr.  
Tanner entered upon the eleventh  
day of his fast. His pulse was 50,  
temperature 97.4, and respiration 14.

Some excitement was caused by  
the statement from Dr. Bradley that  
a sponge saturated with nutritious  
liquid had been found by physicians  
on the victim.

Death of Tilden's Nephew.

The remains of Pelton, the ne-  
phew of Tilden, who died this morn-  
ing, were removed to the residence  
of ex-Governor Tilden. Pelton has  
been ailing for some days, and on  
Monday was taken seriously ill, and  
death resulted from an embolism of  
the heart at 3 a.m. to-day.

Explosion at St. Louis.

The exploring steamer *Eudora*  
has been towed to St. Johns, New  
foundland, disabled.

Sporting Budget.

PHILADELPHIA, 8.—The weather  
is fine, but the water is rough. In  
the boat race, first heat, the senior  
single was won by Mumford, of  
New York, time 11.13. The se-  
cond heat was won by the holder of  
the Purviset Club, Hall, of Har-  
vard, second, time 11.45. The best  
and most exciting race of the day  
was the first heat, four-oared shells,  
and was won by the crew of the  
Argonaut Club, Toronto, University  
of Pennsylvania, and the Wyan-  
dotte Club, of Wyandotte, Michi-  
gan. After a sharp contest the lat-  
ter won, although one of their oars  
broke, time 9.12, the other crew  
finishing in 9.44. In the second  
heat, for four-oared shells, Carman,  
of Carmanville, of New York, Cap-  
tain of the team, and Burke, of  
New York, started. The river was  
covered with white caps. The Eu-  
rope finished half a length in ad-  
vance, in 10.09.

Chicago 8.—The Jockey Club has  
announced a special race of \$2,500,  
free to all, to be trotted during the  
regular meeting on July 22d, mile  
heats, three in five. Entries to be  
delivered to D. H. H. superintendent  
dearly to close July 17th.

Detroit, 8.—Big Medicine won the  
one and one-half mile dash in  
1.52. Alabama won the three-  
fourths mile dash in 59.1. Gold Bug  
won the one and one-half mile  
dash in 2.15. Mary Anderson won  
the two mile race in 8.40.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, 8.—In regard to  
the readjuster's party here that  
they are not in the position to believe  
and have information that General  
Hancock will resign his Major-Gen-  
eralship in the army, it has been  
stated that army officers here have  
any such information, and further,  
they do not believe he will resign.  
There is no reason why he should  
resign, and the readjuster's party  
While the War Department has  
heard nothing from General Han-  
cock, it is believed that he will  
not resign from the army, un-  
less he is ordered to do so by the  
President.

Land Commissioner Williams has  
troubled. An ingenious California  
has entered a stone quarry and gone  
to sleeping time. Now he demands  
the quarry, and the government has  
not yet decided what to do. He has  
entered a heavy document full of  
legal and scientific  
opinions, going to show that lime-  
stone is a public domain, and in fact,  
that any land is national land  
can be entered under the terms of  
the act.

Business by the Overboard.

HANMER, Mo., 8.—The *Chippew*  
this afternoon has an article on the  
losses by breaks in the Bay levee on  
the Illinois side of the Mississippi  
river. After stating the levee is  
fifty-two miles long, extending from  
a point nine miles south of Quincy  
to Hannibal Bay, nine miles south  
of Clarksville, and that it makes  
101,289 acres of land, it reads an es-  
timate of the losses by multiplying  
the number of acres in wheat and  
corn which were overflowed by the  
average yield per acre, which at  
present would show a loss on wheat  
of \$200,000, and about the same  
amount of corn. The other losses,  
as to fences, barns, dwellings, farm-  
ing implements, etc., they will  
reach fully \$100,000, making total  
loss of \$300,000. Not more than one  
third of the wheat or corn crop is  
left. The overflow from the break  
was nearly seventy hours traveling  
twenty-three miles, which gave  
time to save much of the property  
outside of their growing crops.

A Big Fire.

TYNE, 8.—A fire this morning  
destroyed about thirty buildings, in-  
cluding banks, opera house and post-  
office. The loss is estimated at \$150,-  
000.

The fire originated in Woodin's  
livery stable, where nine valuable  
horses were burned, and spread rap-  
idly until sixteen buildings were de-  
stroyed. Very little of the contents  
were saved. Among them were two  
banks, the *Herald* and *Democratic*  
printing offices, two jewelry stores,  
two stationary stores, the postoffice,  
two dry goods establishments and  
several other businesses and dwelling  
houses. The upper story of the City  
Hotel was burned. Two fire com-  
panies from Altoona and one from  
Hannibal arrived. Insurance  
from \$60,000 to \$75,000.

Storm in Iowa.

DES MOINES, 8.—There was a very  
heavy rain fall in Central Iowa last  
night, and the wind did considerable  
damage to the court-house and en-  
gine-house at Winterest. At Buffalo  
four houses and a mill were killed,  
and one man reported killed,  
named Burns. In Hanover, this  
county, two barns and several gar-  
ages were destroyed by wind. Trains  
were delayed. At Clinton on the  
Rock Island railroad by a washout  
at Van Meter. The damage to crops  
in this county is 10 per cent.

Minnesota News.

ST. PAUL, 8.—The census gives  
the population of the city at 41,619,  
an increase of 108 per cent. in ten  
years.

Irish Republican Convention.

INDIANAPOLIS, 8.—The Irish na-  
tional republican convention will be  
held in this city on the 14th inst., as  
previously announced. The report  
of the postponement was without au-  
thority from the committee.

Dismissing Opinion.

Judges Niblack and Scott, of the  
Supreme Court, filed an opinion to-  
day dissenting from the majority in  
cases involving the validity of the  
amendments to the State constitu-  
tion.

Some Shooting.

DANVILLE, Va., 8.—Clem Estes  
(colored) was shot dead by Joseph  
H. Estes, a white farmer, near Cas-  
cade Village. The affair grew out  
of a quarrel.

Denver, 8.—Last night a shoot-  
ing affair occurred between Elmer  
Hayman and Tom Stevens, in  
which the latter was fatally and the  
former seriously wounded. The  
killing was the result of a family feud,  
which had existed for some time.

Nominations.

ST. LOUIS, 8.—The democrats of  
the Fifth Illinois district in conven-  
tion to-day, at Greenup, nominated  
J. W. Fuller for Congress.

MILWAUKEE, 8.—The republicans  
of the seventh district renominated  
H. L. Humphrey to Congress.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Foreign Notes.

LONDON, 8.—In the House of Com-  
mons to-day Premier Gladstone said  
the news of the Russian defeat by  
China was not confirmed, and was  
not believed either by the Chinese  
or Russian governments. In the  
event of war breaking out, he said  
the government will avail itself of  
Russia's offer to enter into com-  
munication respecting British inter-  
ests.

Forward (Liberal) asked whether  
the government, having declined to  
introduce a bill to remove the obsta-  
cle to the legality of Bradlaugh's af-  
firmation, would sanction of justice  
to Bradlaugh, and his constituents  
undertake his defense in any action  
brought against him. Gladstone  
said his constituents know that the  
return of a member is subject to  
law, and that the government is  
unable to interfere.

Bradlaugh disclaimed responsi-  
bility for Norward's question, and  
said he had no doubt of the legality  
of the question.

St. Henry Wall, conservative,  
asked whether the government had  
communicated with other powers  
relative to coercive measures in the  
event of the refusal of Bradlaugh  
to take the oath of allegiance at the  
Berlin Conference.

Gladstone said the government  
policy continues to be to prosecute  
the faithful fulfillment of the Berlin  
Conference. The government has not  
yet been presented to the Porte, it  
would be well to respect and defend  
the rights of the Porte, and to that  
extent will have the advantage of  
their enemies. But the contest pre-  
sents to be lively enough, and to be  
well under way during this month.  
The democratic management of the  
campaign will be seen in their  
directions and their documents, prob-  
ably from this city. Their head-  
quarters will be here. It is said that  
both sides are already assured of  
wherever victory may be necessary  
in the prosecution of the campaign.

The Republican National Com-  
mittee has chosen Hon. Marshall  
Jewell as its chairman, and he will  
have the principal management of  
the campaign. Of the democratic  
committee Hon. Wm. A. Wallace  
will probably be chairman. The  
indications are that the campaign of  
1880 will be the most vigorous  
yet known for many years.
