LOCAL BRIEFS.

Successful Fishing Trip.—Cashier Beebe of Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company has returned from a successful fishing trip up the Weber river.

Will Not Visit Salt Lake.—It is learned that Prof. Pinchot, chief of the U. S. forest service, will not be able to visit Salt Lake this trip west, and will turn east from Ogden on the 23rd inst.

Another Utah Convention.—Utah Lodge No. 1 of the National Association of Stationary Engineers is sending out letters to other lodges asking support in the movement to bring the annual convention of 1909 to Salt Lake. This year's meeting will be held in Denver, Sept. 9.

Saloon Men Meet.—There was a general meeting of saloon men last evening in Eagles' hall, principally to discuss closing the saloons during the summer. The meeting was evenly divided and no action was taken. Another meeting is to be held, but satisfaction was expressed that everything was shut up last Sunday.

Find No Relatives.—Efforts to locate the relatives of F. T. Hernandez, the man who committed suicide by taking a large dose of morphine, have proved futile so far. Chief Pitt wired the chief of police at Jacksonville, Fla., asking for information concerning the dead man's relatives. The reply came back last night that the relatives could not be found.

Funeral of Mrs. McFadden.—The funeral of Mrs. Julia McFadden, a pioneer of Utah and Nevada, died yesterday from the Catholic cathedral. Bishop Scanlan conducting the ritualistic service. Agent Howland Fletcher of Grand Junction will remain in this territory for 10 days, conferring with growers and growers relative to the work.

Plucky Wife Gets Thief.

Mrs. Max Florence Holds to the Coat
Tails of Crook Who Tried to
Rob Husband.

One noted crook is locked up in the city jail and the police are trying to find two confederates, a man and a woman. The crook now in custody is James A. Getz, who was arrested and given a fender on May 11 with the understanding that he should leave Salt Lake. The man is an all round grafter and a clever "dip." Mrs. Florence and that of his companions being to work the rush act in crowded places. Getz was captured about 7 o'clock last night and he had made an unsuccessful attempt to enter the diamond pin from the tie of Max Florence, proprietor of the Elite theater. The man would have escaped, but for the plucky display of Mrs. Florence, who seized the fellow by the coat tails as he dashed into the Louvre cafe. Mrs. Florence hung on to the fellow until her husband and Police Officer J. M. Lyon got hold of him. A man and a woman who were operating with Getz managed to make good their escape.

The bold attempt at robbery occurred on a street car going up from the O. S. L. depot. Mr. and Mrs. Florence had been out to Lagoon and the car they boarded to come up town was somewhat crowded. At Second South and Main street Mr. Florence started to leave the car. The same instant there was a crash and Florence felt Getz tugging at the diamond in his tie. The pin had a safety device and the thief was unable to get the gem. Mrs. Florence saw the attempt and when Getz started to run for the Louvre cafe to go through one door and out another, the plucky woman hung on to his coat tails. Florence followed and Getz ran out on the Second South street side entrance he was gathered in by Police Officer J. M. Lyon. He is booked for attempted grand larceny.

Getz has operated in this city before. When last he was arrested by Detective Sheets with Henry Clark, known as "Whitely," and George A. George. They are all known to the police as crooks. Getz stated that he was on his way to Butte and that his companion had the railway tickets.

ACID IS KNOCKED FROM GIBB'S LIPS

Jessie Oldfield Thwarted in Second Attempt to Take Her Own Life.

DESERTED BY HER HUSBAND

Young Wife Grows Despondent and Tries to Kill Herself in Front of Grand Theater.

A second attempt at suicide was made yesterday afternoon about 6 o'clock by Mrs. Jessie Oldfield, aged 20 years, in front of the Grand Theater on Second South street. The young woman attempted to drink a quantity of carbolic acid, but the drug was knocked from her hand before she could take it. She is now being cared for by her father, J. Hartman, a carpenter at 1248 Myrcian avenue.

About four weeks ago Mrs. Oldfield's husband left her and she has been despondent and discouraged since that time.

Yesterday morning Mrs. Oldfield went to the home of Mrs. Nancy Boone, a floral avenue. She spent the day there talking over her troubles with her friend, Mrs. Boone. The young woman went out and procured a bottle of carbolic acid. Returning to the Boone home she tried to take the poison, but was prevented by her friend. Finally Mrs. Oldfield crossed the street, Mrs. Boone gave the alarm and when Mrs. Oldfield tried to take the poison, persons on the street seized her and the acid was knocked from her hands.

About a year ago H. C. Oldfield, husband of the young woman, left her on account of a family row. At that time the young woman attempted to kill herself, but was prevented. The husband returned and about four weeks ago left again. The couple have been married about three years and have one child, a girl a year old. Oldfield is employed by a dairy company. After attempting to take the poison last evening the young woman went back to the home of Mrs. Boone and later her father called and took her home.

Principal of City School Calls Attention to Undesirable Entertainments.

Miss Evelyn Reilly, principal of the Lincoln school, has addressed a communication to Supt. D. H. Christensen of the city schools, inveighing strongly against the moving pictures or the effect of them on the minds of the young, and suggesting that some steps be taken to correct the evil. Her letter is as follows: "There is probably no child in Salt Lake City between the ages of 6 and 12 who has not attended a picture show several times during the school year, and it behooves us to know whether such shows are an influence for good or ill, in their present state they are, in our judgment, an unmixed evil. The vivid impressions left upon a child's mind by a single harmful picture more than balances the impression left by a dozen good ones. The pictures are so good and the bad ones are so bad, that I think the schools, with the support they would receive from all reputable citizens, to plan some way to censor them."
