Dr. Ormsby promptly responded to a telephone call, ariving on the scene less than 20 minutes after she had swal-lowed the drug. He worked on the palowed the drug. He worked on the patient, using stomach pump and other remedies to counteract the effects of the poison, with but little hope of her recovery. After laboring with the young lady for fully 30 minutes, she finally passed away, within one hour after taking the fatal drug. The father is distracted at his daughter's sad death. Only last June her mother died, leaving a family of small children, and this sad death coming so near, makes a load of grief almost too great to be berne.

The young lady has been in a state The young lady has been in a state of melancholia for some time past, brought on through a long spell of severe sickness, but it was something never thought of by her father and family that she would ever attempt self-destruction. She was well beloved by all who knew her, and her father and family have the profoundest sympathy of the entire community. Funeral services will be held in the Second ward meetinghouse at 2 p. m. tomorrow (Sunday). The city coroner decided that no inquest was necessary as came to her death by poisoning, self-administered, while in a state of insanity. The young lady was born at Kanosh, Millard county, Utah, aud came with her parents to this place four years ago.
