## Irrigation Bill Revives an Old Dispute Between East and West-A Forgotten Hero.

Special Correspondence. Washington, Jan. 11 .- Senator Cullom, chairman of the committee on foreign relations, has determined to give the Senate an opportunity to act one way or another on the reciprocity treaties now pending before his committee. The Illinois senator when he knew he would be chairman of foreign relations began

to study the subject of reciprocity. He made two or three trips to Canton and discussed the subject with the late president. In fact, it was just before the famous Buffalo reciprocity speech

that Senator Cullom spent a day or two at Canton, and the subject was then thoroughly considered. Senator Cullom favors the reciprocity plan. He does not know what his committee will do, however, but he intends it shall do something. There has been some in-dication that the treatles are to be al-lowed to die in committee, a sort of

dication that the treaties are to be al-lowed to die in committee, a sort of lingering death of nonaction, but that is not Senator Cullom's way. He in-tends to get them out and disposed of one way or another. If the senators do not want them, let them say so, is his plan. He is not going to be responsible for killing them with stagnation. FINANCE COMMITTEE WATCHING.

After Senator Cullom's committee gets through with the treaties the finance committee intends to take them if it can. Senator Aldrich, the shrewd

if if can, senator Attrict, the ance, is not supposed to favor reciprocity. He has been saying all along that "we," mean-ing the finance committee, "want to consider these treaties. We want to know how they may affect the reve-ment theft congradue. They should know how they may affect the reve-nue or tariff generally. They should receive the careful consideration of the committee dealing with these sub-jects." And that is what Senator Cul-lom is "up against" as soon as he gets his treaties before the Senate. In fact, it will be the test of their strength.

If they are referred, then goodby treaties, for such a vote will mean that the Senate is not favorable to reciprocity as represented in the treatles.

the isthmian canal treaty the strongest desire of Secretary Hay is to have the reciprocity treaties ratified. They were megodiated under his direction, and he believes thoroughly in the principle of reciprocity as affording great commen-cial advantages to the United States. He has had many consultations with senators and strongly urged the ratifi-cation of the treaties, but the indica-tions are that he has not made a very strong impression. In fact, I am quite

The bill which the men representing arid lands states have prepared with a view to securing irrigation does not wholly meet the approval of those from states that do not need water artificially applied. The people of the east asserthat they have as much interest in the proper care and disposition of public lands as those who live in states where these lands are situated. "The lands belong to the government, and Massachusetts is as much interested in shipping points, not to furnish the lum-bermen any cars, as the entire available ten put. But you can't make the westh'ra. ern men take that view of it, and when they want to use the proceeds of the sale of public lands to irrigate other public lands they think they are taking only what is their just dues. ## FEDERAL COURT.

Jacob Kirsbaum, an Ogden merchant today filed a petition in voluntary bank ruptcy in the United States court. He He represents his debts to amount to \$1,214.79, and his assets \$602.
