FOR THE SALTON SEA.

A specially interesting feature of the meeting of the board was the reading of a letter from local business men asking that the national administration and Congress be asked to allow the Salton sea to remain as benefiting the entire southwest by precipitation from its evaporation. The letter was as fol-"Gentlemen—Your attention is re-

spectfully invited to a consideration of the body of water now being formed in southern California, popularly de-scribed as the 'Salton sea,' and the possible effect of its presence on the climatic conditions of the State of Utah climatic conditions of the State of Utah particularly, and of the arid section of the Pacific slope generally. "Some time ago an irrigation com-pany in an attempt to divert a portion of the waters of the Colorado river onto

certain arid lands which it proposed to redeem, lost control of the river, which left its ancient bed and, following the left its ancient bed and, following the natural physical outlines of the coun-try, poured into the Salton sink, much of which is below the level of the ocean, thus forming the 'Salton sea,' which now covers an area of 500 square miles and has a maximum depth of about 75 feet. The irrigation company to which reference is made, and the South-ern Pacific Railroad company, which has three times had to remove its tracks out of the way of the encroach-ing waters, have spent over \$2,000,000 in tracks out of the way of the encroach-ing waters, have spent over \$2,000,000 in an attempt to confine the Colorado river within its original channel, while the president of the United States has offi-cially declared that this must be done, and at once, by the Southern Pacific Railroad company. Whether this can be done or not remains, of course, to be seen, but so far all efforts in that di-rection, though directed by the most competent of engineers, has been marked by signal failure. "The 'Salton, sea' is already sufficient-ly large to exert an appreciable effect on the climate of the contiguous coun-

ly large to exert an appreciable effect on the climate of the contiguous coun-try, and it is estimated that at the present rate of flow it will take seven years to fill the great earth depression known as the 'Salton sink.' and if this flow shall be voluntarily or involun-tarily allowed to continue there will be at the end of that time a great inland sea on the Pacific slope, the outlet of which will be determined either by the prevailing physical. conditions of the country or by the dictum of scientists. "This sea, 4,000 square miles in ex-tent, and with a maximum depth of 265 feet, would not only furnish a field for tent, and with a maximum depth of 265 feet, would not only furnish a field for the operations of navigation, but would in all probability work a material and beneficial change in a section of the arid west embracing all of Nevada. Utah and Arlzona, and large parts of Oregon, idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico.
