

## Saltair Dons Holiday Dress For Season of Pleasure

Holiday dress is now being put on everywhere at Saltair in preparation for the opening of the world famous resort by the Great Salt Sea Decoration day. Visitors to the resort this season will hardly recognize the place, for with new paint, alterations and decorations it will appear better than ever before and every chance to make the place more convenient for the pleasure seeker has been grasped by the carpenters, painters and decorators who have been at the pavilion for the last month.

In addition to the usual features found at the resort in past seasons, a number of new concessions have been added and those found there before have been improved. Foremost among these is the steel saucer track where bicycle races will be held, rain or shine during the entire season, barring the opening week. Finishing touches are yet to be put to this structure and the opening will not be made until everything is complete. This will probably be within a week or 10 days. Not all the world is a better track to be found, say experts in construction and bicyclists who have seen it.

Another improvement which will be appreciated on "rush" days is the fact that the floor space on the pavilion has been increased so that 15,000 people may be provided for without discomfort to a single patron. Remodeling and alterations have been the order of the season in the bathing department and 200 additional suits have been placed at the disposal of bathers. No waiting for keys or suits is in prospect for this summer. Too, the water this year is higher than in past years and the re-

sort looks for an unusually large patronage in this department this year. Band concerts every afternoon and band music to dance to is to be provided this season. No charge will be made this year for admission to the dance floor. Many novel attractions have been booked by the management for this season, the first to appear being the Strobel airship. This ship must be seen to be appreciated, as it is no mere balloon, but a scientific airship. Added efficiency is assured in the train service department, both in equipment and running time and schedules. With the promise of better things in every department, Saltair bids for a big season with good offers to the amusement seeking public.

### GEORGE TREMAYNE DEAD.

Found in Roominghouse by Companion—May Contest Insurance Policy.

George Tremayne, a mechanic recently employed at the Knudson novelty works on east Second South street, was found dead in his bed in room 7 of the Rosland roominghouse at the rear of 114 east Second South street, about 9 o'clock this morning, by Dan Irvine, who was a chum of Tremayne's. Tremayne was about 30 years of age. So far as known had not been ill recently. He had been married but some time ago was divorced by his wife, who lives with their child on Second East between South Temple and First South streets.

Tremayne was a brother to Fred Tremayne, who was killed on the O. S. L. railroad near Woods Cross, several months ago. He leaves another brother named Henry, a fruit peddler. He also

leaves two sisters, Mrs. Gallifant and Mrs. Gerena, and two half-brothers. To one of the latter the dead man left a life insurance policy for \$1,000, but the remaining full brother, Henry, says he will do all in his power to see that the policy is contested.

When the body of Tremayne was discovered, the landlady, Mrs. A. E. Oakden, notified Justice Smith and the police. The body was sent to O'Donnell's undertaking parlors. No inquest will be held.

### FUNERAL OF DAVID JAMES.

Pioneer in Utah's Plumbing Trade Honored by Sorrowing Friends.

The Twenty-fourth ward chapel was filled to its capacity on the occasion of the funeral of the late David James, pioneer plumber and one of the early business men of Utah, who died May 23. Bishop William Wood presided at the obsequies, and music was furnished by the choir and Miss Edna Evans and Ashley Wallace as soloists.

The speakers of the occasion were Elders L. J. Haddock, William McLachlan, C. C. Shaw of Hyrum, President John R. Winder and President Joseph F. Smith, all of whom spoke in the highest terms of the deceased, recounting incidents in his life that showed the untarnished metal of which he was moulded.

Elders J. B. Midgley and William A. per offered the opening and closing prayers. The master plumbers of the city attended the services in a body and contributed a floral design.

### INTERESTING FEDERAL ORDER.

Traffic on Lagoon Road Held to be "Intra State" in Appliance Case.

Judge Marshall held today that the Salt Lake & Ogden (Lagoon) route was not subject to interstate commerce acts regarding the use of safety appliances when it hauled a car along its own line with an engine, not in good repair. The hearing was started this morning but came to an abrupt end, when the defendant was given a dismissal. Some time ago a car of material for the Salt Lake & Ogden came from Joliet, Ill. It was delivered from the Rio Grande yards to the Oregon Short Line yards and from the latter to a Lagoon route track. An engine, alleged to have been crippled, picked it up here and hauled it out on the Lagoon line. These were the facts which were brought out this morning and which resulted in the court's decision. Judge Marshall held that the car had reached its destination, so far as interstate commerce was concerned, when it was shunted by the Oregon Short Line to the Lagoon
