Fractional Currency Matters.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 25.—The
Director of the Mint has suggested the
proposal of the Treasury De-
partment making a careful estimate
of the annual expense of preparing,
issuing, redeeming, cancelling and
renewing the fractional currency,
also an estimate as to the average
amount of such currency in course
of transit to and from the Treasury
Department, and the average amount
in the Treasury undergoing exami-
nation preparatory to its can-
cellation, or awaiting such exami-
nation; this information is neces-
sary to correctly understand the
comparative advantages as to the
cost of issue and maintaining in
good condition the fractional silver
and the fractional paper currency
respectively.

Business in the Criminal Court.

In the criminal court, to-day, the
cases of Charles G. Fisher, the
Leighton, Wm. M. Evans, and
John Green, indicted for conspiracy
to defraud the U. S., were called
for trial. The argument was
taken up by the government, and
the defendants having failed in
their efforts to require the gov-
ernment to elect on which count
of the three indictments they would
ask the accused to plead, filed a
plea in abatement, challenging the
array of the grand jury which found
the indictments, on the ground of
illegality. The argument was pos-
tponed until Monday week.
