Interesting Scrap of History .-

On the 20th of January last, Bishop Frederick Kesler, of the Sixteenth Ward of this city, attained the allotted age of man-"three score years and ten"-and on that day had his photograph taken to send to his relatives in the States. We were shown one of the

pictures to-day-a most excellent likeness-and read on the back of it a brief sketch of the Bishop's history, written by his own hand, containing a number of interesting items, which

we asked the privilege of copying. He states that he was born in Meadville, Crawford County, Pennsylvania, January 20, 1816, and at the age of five years was left an orphan. He .worked as a millwright five years, and in the year 1835 removed to Iowa, in which

State, as well as in the States of Kansas and Nebraska, he built the first flouring mills ever known there. Altogether he built mills in ten different States. He was intimately acquainted with the Prophet Joseph Smith from the year 1839 until his martyrdom, was baptized in June, 1840, in Nauvoo, and was present when the Prophet deposited the original manuscript of the Book of Mormon in the cornerstone of
