

MORGAN STAKE CONFERENCE.

Minutes of the Morgan Stake Conference held August 14th and 15th, 1880, at South Morgan School House. Present on the stand: The Presidency of the Stake, High Council, Bishops, etc.

Saturday, 10 a. m.

Opening exercises. Samuel Francis, Sen., of the Stake Presidency, spoke of our pleasing prospects, both temporal and spiritual.

Elder Robert Hogg, Sen., exhorted the Saints to remember that temporal affairs should not be our only or chief consideration.

Bishop J. R. Porter said we should never be too busy or too weary to serve God. It was humility that gave strength, and not pride. Our Father would make any one equal to every emergency, who would magnify his calling.

Apostles Franklin D. Richards and Albert Carrington arrived by the 11.45 train.

President W. G. Smith spoke on prayer. God always kept his pledges; we often violated ours. Opposition produced weakness, showed the heavy responsibility under which God's Priesthood were laboring.

Saturday, 2 p. m.

The Bishops were called upon to report their several wards, and advised, if any division existed, to state the cause of it. They responded accordingly.

Elder Jesse Haven read from Ezekiel 18 chap., 24th verse. Said some people thought they could be saved on the merits of what good they had once done, independent of their present conduct. Thought a present departure from the principles of purity and uprightness would nullify the effects of former good works according to the passages quoted.

Elder Richard Frye, of the Stake Presidency, contrasted our early anxiety for spiritual food with our present apathy. We should not expect perfection in any one, neither object to them because they had not attained to it. Wished to support the right men with his means, influence and ability.

Apostle F. D. Richards said there was a way of the Lord to be happy and united, and it was our especial business to find out that way and walk in it.

Sunday, 10 a. m.

Opening exercises.

Apostle Albert Carrington said all the time spent otherwise than in serving God was utterly lost. Strenuously advised the keeping holy of the Sabbath day. Explained what true liberty consisted of, and the legitimate exercise of personal authority. Every person had a right to do good, work righteousness and serve God, but no other right. Spoke at some length on political matters, and showed where opposition or ginated and by what class of spirits it was fostered and maintained.

Sunday, 2 p. m.

After opening exercises and administration of the Sacrament, the clerk read the Stake statistical report.

Counselor Francis presented the local authorities and home missionaries, who were unanimously sustained.

Apostle F. D. Richards read a passage from the Prophet Isaiah, also a part of Section 64 Doc. and Cov. Here was the appointed place for the people to be taught in God's ways, and to learn to walk in his paths. Sickness and sorrow were God's messengers to humble and chasten the human heart. Bishops should ward off, and warn against danger, and act as teachers themselves when necessary. Advised arbitration and compromise in case of disputes, rather than decision by courts, either civil or religious. Politics were a part of his religion, as they concerned the future happiness of the Latter-day Saints as well as others. Spoke powerfully on the happy results of continual love for each other, and willing, and sincere forgiveness, and cautioned the Saints against giving too frequent occasion for forgiveness.

Elder S. Francis gave notice that work would be immediately resumed on the Stake House, etc.

The spirit of God was plentifully bestowed, and the conference literally a spiritual feast.

One red and white spotted OX, lineback, star on forehead, white under belly, crop off right ear, upper and underbit in left, brand on left hip resembling J in circle, and same on left shoulder, about eight years old.

One red and white OX, part lineback, white spot on forehead the shape of a heart, four white feet, white under belly, large white spot on the back between the hip bones and runs down on the right side very near the flank, square crop off the right ear and under bit and slit in the same, branded 7 with cross on the left hip and on left horn resembling D H 5, about seven years old, dewlap.

One red and white speckled STEER, red ears, crop and two slits in right ear and under half crop in left, branded with cross on left side, about five years old.

One brown STEER, square crop off right ane crop and notch out of the end and under bit in the left ear. branded WH joined on the left hip and OI in two places on the left side, also ID on the right hip and T on the left jaw. JA

about five or six years old. One red and white STEER, large white spot on forehead, two large white places on the right side, white spots on the legs, crop and two slits in the right ear and under half crop off the left, brand on the left side resembling a cross, about four or five years old.

One light red COW, square crop off both ears and slit in the right, branded S & B on the left thigh and two other large brands on the same side illegible, about six years old.

One brindle and white COW, brindle head and neck, spotted on the sides, dark legs, under half crop in each ear, brand on the left side resembling D, about eight years old, has a large calf with her about the same color as the cow only lighter.

One red and brockle face COW, with crumpled horns, some white spots on belly, square crop off left ear, and slit and two notches in right ear, branded O I on left sides branded on left hip resembling U; about 5 years old.

One dark red and white spotted COW, large horns, large white spot on forehead, upper half crop off right ear, underbit in left, close up to her head, no brands visible; five or six years old, seems to be very wild.

One brown HEIFER, line back, speckled head, white under belly, crop off each ear, and slit in the right, brand on right hip resembling JF combined, about three years old.

One red and white COW, red head and neck, under half crop off right ear, brand resembling A with a blotch over it, six or seven years old.

One red HEIFER, white spot in forehead, square crop and three slits in each ear, and three illegible brands on the left shoulder; about three years old.

One black and white HEIFER, line back, left hind leg white, square crop and notch out of the right ear, no brands visible; about two years old.
