SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Police and Firemen to be Given An Increase of Salary in The New Year.

SUPPRESS GAMBLING.

Police and Other Officers Will Stop All Games of Chance-Other Notes.

Ogden, Dec. 19 .- At its meeting last night the city council passed an ordinance regulating the salaries of the fire and police departments. It provides as follows:

Police Department-Captain, \$100; city detective, \$100; sergeants, \$90 each patrolmen, \$80.

Fire Department-Assistant chief and electrician, \$90; captan, \$90; divers, \$75. The salary of the janitor of the city hall was increased to \$60 a month. it was decided to give the city em-

ployes a payday before Christmas. The question of granting a franchise to the Ogden Waterworks company was laid over until Wednesday evening. It is expected that the franchise will be completed then. It is understood that when the franchise is formulated, with both sides making concessions on certain points, it will be passed, thus endthe long controversy between the company and the city.

GAMBLING MUST STOP.

Police in Earnest in Effort to Suppress Games of Chance.

Ogden, Dec. 19 .- I. B. Jones, who has been conducting the Turf Exchange gambling rooms, has been arrested by the police on the charge of opening up his place against the orders of Chief of Police Browning. The proposition to stop gambling in Ogden by District At-torney Halverson and the police is to be gried out. The laws on gambling ust be complied with in Ogden in the future, the officers declare, and those who attempt to violate them must pay the penalty. The slot machines that were scattered throughout the city have been closed up tight and in most in-stances taken out. The slot and card machines used in some of the saloons and cigar stores were last evening closed up by the police and the propriethe various places notified not to run them again.

HELD FOR BURGLARY.

Engene Bryan, Alleged Suit Case Thief, Waives Preliminary Hearing.

Ogden, Utah, Dec. 19.-Eugene Bryan, colored, is now confined in the county jail awaiting trial on the charge of burglary in the first degree. He was arrested last week on the charge of stealing a suit case valued at \$75 from a Pullman sleeper in the Union depot yards in this city. He was, however, observed in the theft and captured, after a chase of nearly half a mile. He was arraigned before Judge Murphy on the charge and by the consent of county Attorney E. T. Hulaniski was permitted to walve preliminary examinamitted to waive preliminary examina-tion and was bound over to answer to the charge to the district court under \$500 bond, in default of which he was turned over to the custody of Sheriff

Bryan, it is believed, has been work ing the suit case stealing in a careful, systematic manner. He was a cook on the railway dining cars, and by some means he obtained keys, so it is stated, to Pullman sleepers, and when an op-portunity presented itself he would put on a white porters' coat and enter the "spotted" car as if to do his work and then steal a suit case which he would carry away. It is stated by the officers that Bryan is suspected of stealing 14 suit cases at various times, from passengers. It is believed when Bryan comes up for trial in the district court he will plead guilty to the charge.

NO NEW DAM IN OGDEN CANYON

Utah Light & Railway Company Abandons Plan to Reclaim The Arid Waste.

OPPOSITION FROM CITIZENS.

Contended that the Dam Would be a Source of Danger to Residents Of the Valley,

Ogden, Dec. 19 .- The Utah Light & Rallway company this morning withdrew its petition from the board of county commissioners, and will abandon its pian for building a dam at the head of Ogden canyon. This action was taken by Manager E. W. Wade of the company, after the commissioners had begun to consider the matter of granting the franchise.

The immediate cause for the withdrawal was opposition to the move-ment expressed in petitions by resi-dents to the commissioners. The petitions were from about 500 land owners living in the Third ward of Ogden, and in Eden. Huntsville and Liberty, the three towns situated in Ogden valley. The petitions set forth that the dam would be a source of danger, as the volume of water stored by it would, if it should ever break loose, submerge a large tract of territory. They also recited that the contemplated reservoir in addition would inundate a large acreage in Ogden valley, which would work a hardship upon the residents of the valley towns, and expressed other objections

WITHDRAWN BY WADE.

After the presentation of the petitions, Manager Wade asked permission to speak on the matter, and to the surprise of the commissioners, reested the privilege of withdrawing quested the privilege of withdrawing the petition for a franchise. He stated in doing this that the company had no desire to build a dam if it did not meet with public approval. He said that the company had thought that the improvement would benefit the community, as it would store water enough for irrigation purposes, as well as for for irrigation purposes, as well as for power purposes. County Commission-ers Madsen, Stanford and Wilson granted the request after expressing the belief that the contemplated improvement would have been very desirable, and a blessing to the community, and stating that they regretted that opposition had been expressed towards

When seen after the meeting, Manager Wade stated that the company would abandon the scheme, and also that it would do nothing with the mooted south fork project. This was abandoned several years ago, he said, as measurements proved that not sufficient water could be stored, and that the cost for a dam would be too great to make it practicable. to make it practicable.

MAY BE DISMISSED.

It is probable that tomorrow one of the bounty fraud cases against Wm. R. Swan and Arthur Thomas which has been commenced at the instance of the First National bank of Ogden, will be dismissed on a technicality. Today, in the preliminary hearing Judge Murphy granted a motion of defendant's attorney prohibiting the introduction of fur-ther evidence. This was on the grounds that the state had appropriated money to reimburse the First National bank, and that therefore no crime had been committed against it, and it had no cause for action. Following the granting of the motion, defendant's attorney voted for dismissal of the case. The county attorney, opposed the motion, and asked for time to consider it. He was granted until tomorrow morning

WANT PENSION LAW AMENDED. The Utah Indian war veterans have sent communications to each member of the Utah congressional delegation setting out the work performed by the Utah militia in the early days in pro-

tecting the settlers from the Indians, for which the Indian fighters have received no compensation. They ask the Utah delegation to work for an amend-ment to the pension law, covering such Indian service, passed by Congress July 27, 1892, and amended June 27, 1902, so as to make the provision of the law applicable to all Indian war veterans from the years 1853 to 1889.
