## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Thermometer.**—The thermometer noted 91 deg. in the shade this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

**High Council.**—The High Council will meet at the Council House this evening, at half-past 7 o'clock.

**Loss and Gain.**—If it were not for the breeze the heat would be insufferable; if it were not for the dust the weather would be agreeable. No gain without some loss.

**For the South.**—Dr. Jno. R. Park started for Provo this morning. He will be joined there by Professor M. H. Hardy, when they will set out on their trip through Southern Utah on educational business. They expect to return about the middle of August.

**The Race.**—The trotting race for \$250 took place this afternoon at Agricultural Park. The horses were to start promptly at three o'clock. The competitors were "Countryman," "Mary Emory," and "Major King." The result of the race had not been learned as we went to press.

**Primaries Notice.**—The children of the Primary Association of the several wards are requested to meet in the Assembly Hall to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock sharp. **Imported Sheep.**—A gentleman arrived this morning from Ogden, with 60 head of French and Spanish Merino rams, just brought from California. They are for sale, and may be seen at the Tithing yard. A good chance is here offered our Utah sheep raisers to improve their stock. The present lot will be sold at once, and if they go off well, another importation will arrive at an early day.

**Held in Bonds.**—The two colored boys, H. S. and Samuel Dorsey, arrested on suspicion of burglary, and examined on that charge yesterday afternoon, were, at the conclusion of the hearing, each bound over in \$500 to await the action of the Grand Jury. The stolen jewelry found in their possession was identified by the various owners, and there was no room left for a doubt that they were guilty of the robberies of which they were accused.

**Smash-Up.**—Shortly after one o'clock this afternoon, a runaway occurred on the street leading east from the News office. No one was hurt, but the vehicle, a light express drawn by one horse, was badly smashed and the harness torn into shreds. The team came down the steep hill, east of the residence of Mr. Heber Young, and was flung down the embankment near the street railroad. The horse, after breaking loose from the wagon, was captured several blocks away.

**From Cache Valley.**—Superintendent Geo. W. Tinscher, of the Utah and Northern, was in town yesterday.

He says it will be incorporated in a few days, with a capital of \$10,000. The purpose of the board, in brief, is to deal with manufacturers, to bring the masses down away with "middle men" and thereby relieve the people of much needless expense.

The meetings were very interesting and at the close of the afternoon the congregation arose and sang, "The Spirit of God like a fire is burning," with grand effect.

Mothers should look cheerful in the presence of their children, that the latter might reflect back their good nature, partake of the same good spirit, and so keep home perpetually happy and agreeable.
