Newsy Items of the Mines, Mills and Tintic Prospects.

Eureka, May 16 .- The contractors who are to do the grading for the new smelter to be erected near Silver City are now upon the ground and it is reported that the work of breaking ground will be started the first of next week. The surveyors who have been running the line for the new railroad to connect the smelter with some of to connect the smeller with some of the big mines of the district have about finished their work. Mr. Nidley, a prime mover in the building of both the smeller and the railroad, was over the route of the proposed road the other day and it is understood that a right of way has been secured from many of the claim owners over whose property the road will be built. The Dakota company has had a force of men at work at the old Buckeye mine south of Diamond the past two months.

Owing to the recent storms which Owing to the recent storms which put the wagon roads in bad condition at Silver the Thitic Iron mine has not been sending out the usual amount of ore, the shipments at present, however, are about 125 tons daily. The Bullock company near Silver City continues to take out some good ore and shipments will be fortheoming regularly in the future. The returns from the last shipment show that the mine is being worked at a pretty fair profit.
