MANY SPECIALS DECLARED.

Measurements to Stockholders Should
Do Much to Ease Money
Situation.

The end of December and the beginning of January will witness some important payments by Utah's leading industrial and banking concerns to their stockholders. The list is not yet fully made up because all of the meetings of the boards of directors have not yet taken place, but those which have met have declared the usual December dividends and the usual extra. In some cases there is an advance in the total for last year.

TRADE REPORTS ABOUT THE SAME

Show Little Change from Last
Week but Greater Confidence for the Future.

THE HOLIDAY BUSINESS LESS.

Jobbing and Wholesale Lines Are
Quiet While Manufacturing Op-
erations Are Curtailed.

New York, Dec. 13.—R. G. Dun &
Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say:

Commercial reports indicate little alteration in the past week, but greater confidence in a marked improvement Jan. 1. Holiday trade monopolizes attention, in some sections exceeding that of last year, although aggregate sales do not compare favorably with 1906 to date. Jobbing and wholesale lines are seasonably quiet, while manufacturing operations are curtailed pending the resumption of normal demands.

The supply of labor has not increased in ratio to the closed plants, however, owing to immigration, about double that of last year.

Some sections report a better sentiment in the iron and steel industry, although new business is limited and lit-

tle recovery is expected until next year. Several orders for rolling stock were placed this week and more business of this nature is under negotiation, while the official report of exports of products of iron and steel show a total value of \$165,000,000 in 10 months of 1907, or over 16 per cent of the value of all merchandise sent abroad.

A better inquiry in the leather market promised a revival of business after Jan. 1. Prices are steady for standard sole, although some odd lots have been disposed of at further concessions. Hitting leather is dull and weak. Signs of improvement multiply in the hide market, business in all kinds of domestic packer and country hides this week being larger than at any time for two months. Prices are steadier in some cases, advances of a full cent being reported. Foreign hides share the better feeling, quotations at the Antwerp auction sale exceeding expectations.

BANK CLEARINGS

New York, Dec. 13.—The clearing bank report for the week ending Dec. 12 shows an aggregate of \$2,212,250,000 as against \$2,173,832,000 last week, and \$2,328,500 in the corresponding week last year.

Canadian clearings for the week total \$9,374,000 as against \$9,707,000 last week and \$9,224,000 in the same week last year.

NEW \$20 GOLD PIECES ARE AT A PREMIUM

New York, Dec. 13.—The fact that the new \$20 gold pieces are very scarce and that collectors are already paying a large premium for them, has started a rumor among the young men of Wall street, who some day hope to be brokers, that a mistake was made at the mint and that there is more than \$20 worth of gold in the coins. The reason there is a scramble along the curb in the street to obtain the new coins. Only a small number were sent to the subtreasury in New York, and they were quickly bought up by collectors. Now the demand has grown so strong that as high as \$25 is being offered for the coins. It has been announced that when the next issue is made there will be several changes in the coins and this, of course, is what has made the demand from collectors and dealers. However, the Wall street young men are not convinced and in the meantime the authorities still believe that there is more gold in the new coins than there should be.

RESULT OF HOODLUMISM.

Little Boy Badly Hurt—Connell Session—Death of Mrs. Anderson.

Murray, Dec. 14.—An accident occurred here Thursday noon of a most serious nature. It was a case in which the innocent suffer the injury aimed at the guilty. The case was one in which a Greek was being maliciously attacked and snowballed by a number of boys, who evidently have no regard for law or the protection of life. The Greek retaliated, and with a good sized rock, made his defense, but instead of the hoodlums getting what they well deserved, a little innocent boy named Norman Winder, fell the victim. The lad was rendered unconscious, receiving the full force of the missile. He was struck in the back of the head and had it not been for quick medical aid his injuries might have proved fatal.

As it is the boy's life is saved but he has suffered a great injury, and is not able to attend his school duties. A great lesson might be drawn from the occurrence if given a little thought. It should be remembered that all people have a common right in this country of ours, and it many times occurs in cases of this kind, that our most esteemed friends fall the victim of our vicious attacks. The hoodlumism should be stopped and if it is continued through neglect on the part of any of the officers, it should be thoroughly investigated, as those disturbances are as frequent as the snow storms, and these boys have, for the past two years or more, inadvertently disregarded the Russian and have interfered with pedestrians as they pass up and down the streets.

DEATH OF SARAH A. ANDERSON

A sad death occurred at Union Sunday morning in the passing from life of Mrs. Sarah A. Anderson who succumbed to an attack of heart trouble. The deceased was the wife of Andrew C. Anderson, and was the mother of seven children all of whom survive her. Mrs. Anderson was a native of Coventry, England. When five years old she came to Utah with her parents, Henry and Elizabeth Walton Russell, and since then this country has been her home.

The funeral services were held Wednesday from the Union ward meeting-house at 11 a. m. Bishop W. C. Burson presiding. The ward choir sang the selection "The Deepening Trials Through Your Way, etc." "Shall We Meet Beyond the River?" "My Home on High." Miss Irene Owen sang the solo "Unanswered Yet." Those who eulogized the beautiful life and character of the deceased were Bishop Burson, Elders Wm. D. Kuhn, Andrew Anderson, John W. Keddington, John G. Sharp, and William J. Painter.

The beautiful floral offerings and the large attendance of relatives and friends evidenced the esteem in which she was held and the sorrow her death brought upon the community. Interment was in the South Cottonwood cemetery.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Arthur Townsend was chosen president of the council at the last session to fill the vacancy caused by the death of L. B. Powell.

The matter of insuring the fire station and apparatus, the jail and sprinkling wagon was a feature under consideration. Two representatives of local insurance companies were present soliciting the insurance. The Erickson Realty company was successful in securing a contract with the city for a firm, writing \$18,000 on the three properties.

Resolutions of condolence in respect to the late L. B. Powell, who at the time of death was president of the city council was read, and a copy ordered sent to the bereaved family.

The engineer reported that the cement curbing on the east side of Main street, is finished and is ready for inspection.

The road supervisor's report for the month of November were allowed and warrants ordered drawn on the city treasurer to the amount of \$500.

The volunteer fire department rendered a report to the effect that only one fire had occurred during the month of November.

The treasurer reported that he had received \$7,500 from the county auditor as taxes.

The finance committee informed the council that it had made arrangements with the bank for \$3,500, which they consider a sufficient amount to carry the city until the city's revenue would offset it.

The street lighting committee submitted a report and suggested that are lights be placed on every fourth pole on State street through the city, taking those on the side streets to accomplish this object, and that all side streets be lighted with incandescent lights. The proposition met with approval and the report was sent to the mayor for his signature.

SCHOOL HOLIDAY.

Before the issue of another Saturday "News" the schools will be closed for Christmas. Children are looking forward in anticipation for the event. Vacation will extend from Dec. 20 to Jan. 6, two weeks.
