

HUSBAND'S HEROIC FIGHT FOR WIFE

She Plunged Into Niagara River
Just Above Falls, He Follow-
ing Without Hesitation.

SHE DIED IN HIS ARMS.

Could Not Save Her, Being Too Weak
To Hold Her Up, Finally He Was
Rescued; Her Body Recovered.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., June 6.—
Aaron Cohen of Buffalo saw his young
wife leap into the swirling river be-
tween Second and Third Streets and
this afternoon, only 150 feet above
the brink of the cataract, without a
moment's hesitation he followed her,
caught her hand and struggled desper-
ately to save her.

Mrs. Cohen probably died in her
husband's arms. Before it was possi-
ble to bring efficient help to the
spot, during all of which time
Cohen was making frantic attempts
to reach the shore. But the struggle
against the current at this point is
about 20 miles an hour—was be-
yond his power. Fortune aided him.
With his wife tightly clasped to him
he felt himself jump into a tree stump
and on this he got a grip with his one
free hand. He shouted for help.
Finally word was carried to the re-
servation police and Policeman James
Martin and three other men with
ropes hurried to the scene.

Three times they threw the rope
before it fell within Cohen's grasp.
When he did catch it he was too
weak to tie it about his own or his
wife's waist. The two were 20 feet
away from shore and it was ex-
tremely difficult owing to the precarious
nature of the footing, to make a good
cast. Pinned against the tree stump
by the terrible rush of water, all the
strength had gone out of Cohen and
he had been unable to keep his
wife's face above the water.

Once Cohen had hold of the rope
the men on shore began to pull, and
Martin, who was in the front, slipped
and fell into the stream, but quickly
regained his feet. When within 15
feet of the shore, Cohen lost his grip
on his wife's body and it was carried
down stream and was lost to view.

Cohen was so far gone when the
rescuers got him on shore that he
could not speak for 10 minutes.
His first words were:

"She is out there, God and get her,
she is dead. She died in my arms."

Superintendent Perry and Chief
Shoemaker skinned the Goat island
shore looking for the body, but could
see nothing of it.

William Barnett and Hugh Brown
saw the body after a long search. It
was held fast by a rock about 100
feet above the falls. When ropes
Brown and Barnett waded out into
the stream and moving carefully over
the slippery rocks reached the body.
Just as Brown touched it the current
caught it again and it whirled around
in an eddy. It was with the greatest
difficulty that the two men brought
the body to land.

Cohen says that worry over the fact
that she was unable to nurse her in-
fant, depressed his wife greatly and
probably caused her desire for death.
He is a robust man and quickly re-
covered from the shock.

him and had him almost unconscious
from a beating when others interfered.
When the police came, Smith denied
that he was wounded, but they saw the
blood stains and insisted on taking him
to the hospital, where the doctors said
he would probably die. The five men
who were engaged in the fight with
Smith were arrested and although
Smith refused to say who shot him,
the police say that several witnesses
pointed out McNally.

OPPOSITION DEVELOPING TO ZANGWILL'S PLANS

New York, June 7.—Considerable op-
position is developing to Israel Zang-
will and his project under which Jews
are to make a contract to irrigate Mes-
opotamia at a cost of \$10,000,000, and to
receive in turn from Turkey the right
of colonization of the land and finally
establishing a state there.

It is expected this opposition will
strongly manifest itself at the coming
Zionist convention which will open here
with 500 delegates from all parts of the
United States next Sunday. An article
by Louis Lipsky, editor of the Mac-
millan, the official organ of the
Zionists, takes Zangwill to task for his
attitude declaring that Zangwill, as

the head of the Jewish territorial as-
sociation, desires to establish a nation
in Mesopotamia. Editor Lipsky writes
that the Zionists' one idea is to estab-
lish a Jewish state in Palestine only.
The article says Zangwill ignores the
Zionists.

REPLICA OF SAN FRANCISCO MEDAL FOR PREST. TAFT

San Francisco, June 7.—Before his
departure for Yosemite valley late last
night, Ambassador J. P. Jusserand, enter-
tained Gov. Gillett and Mayor Taylor at
dinner and on behalf of the French
government presented them with silver
replicas of the medal which France,
through him, gave to the city of San
Francisco Saturday.

The third and only other replica of
the medal will be presented to Presi-
dent Taft as soon as Ambassador Jus-
serand returns to Washington.

Ambassador Jusserand visited the
University of California and Mount
Tahoe, where for the first time the
French flag was raised on the mountain.

YUAN SHIH KAI ORDERED TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Chicago, June 7.—A report from Pe-
kin cabled to the Record-Herald says:
A report is current that five court of-
ficials are now on their way to Hona-
g, carrying the imperial yellow cord, sig-
nifying the throne's order that Yuan
Shih Kai shall commit suicide.

The report is accompanied by circum-
stantial details to the effect that the
officials are to watch Yuan Shih Kai
day and night, giving him two months in
which to carry out the order.
The present persistent revival of the
death story is coincident with the re-
ported serious illness of Prince Ching,
and is given color by the admitted fact
that the present dowager empress, wid-
ow of the late emperor and official co-
regent, is bent upon Yuan Shih Kai's
death.

WORLD'S MOTORCYCLE RECORD FOR 5 MILES

San Bernardino, Cal., June 7.—Paul
Derkum of Los Angeles lowered the
world's motorcycle record yesterday by
covering five miles in a competitive race
at 4:16 2-5, standing start.

WILL ATTEMPT TO CROSS ATLANTIC IN A BALLOON

Chicago, June 7.—With the same
northeast trade winds which Colum-
bus figured out his route to the dis-
covery of America, Joseph Brucker,
former editor of the Staats Zeitung,
and commissioner to Germany from the
St. Louis world's fair, says he will
attempt to cross the Atlantic ocean in
an airship or dirigible balloon.

Mr. Brucker arrived in Chicago yester-
day on a visit to friends. He de-
clared it was possible to cross the
ocean in an airship and that he would
put his theories into execution some
time next spring.

"The Wright brothers and Count Ze-
ppelin agree with me," he said, "that it
is perfectly in reason that a balloon
or airship properly constructed, could
cross the ocean safely."

"I will spend most of the winter in
building my airship, and in the spring
I expect to start my voyage from Ca-
dis, Spain. I expect to land either in
Cuba or somewhere in the middle
states."

MAN GOES MAD, KILLS FIVE MEN

John Murphy, a Pig Sticker,
Spreads Terror Among Hun-
dreds of Fellow Employees.

HIS KNIFE WAS LIKE A RAZOR.

Finally Captured, Placed in Padded Cell
Where He Alternately Raved
And Prayed.

Somerville, Mass., June 5.—John
Murphy turned from pig sticking to
man killing in the North Packing &
Provision company's slaughter house
today and, driving his fellow workmen
before him, slew five of them and
wounded four others.

Two of the wounded were reported
as dying.

Hayes was fearfully slashed and he
and Cheever are not expected to sur-
vive. Murphy has been about pecu-
liarily for some days, but he returned
from his dinner apparently in a normal
condition. One hour later he sprang
at Mr. Hayes waving his 15-inch razor-
edge knife in his hand. He cut Dr.
Hayes a deep slash on the neck, stab-
bed him over the heart, and practi-
cally disemboweled him. The terrified
workmen rushed for the door, but
Murphy ran after them, slashing right
and left. Every man whom he struck
went down. The crowd plunged down
stairs with Murphy after them, and at
every landing he cut somebody. On the
second floor one of the workmen,
an Italian, seized a heavy bar of iron
and felled Murphy, but he was quick-
ly on his feet again and wounded an-
other man. On the street floor he was
given another heavy blow on the head
and his knife was wrested from his
hand. Two policemen came to assist
the workmen and Murphy was given a
fearful beating before he finally was
overpowered.

Murphy is 50 years old, weighs 200
pounds and was regarded as one of the
strongest men in the plant. He had
been employed at pig killing for some
years by the North company.

Witnesses of the slaughter said to-
night that more than 300 employees
were driven from the plant when Mur-
phy started on his wild rush through
the six floors and basement and not a
few men escaped death by a narrow
margin.

Dr. E. W. Clark of West Somerville,
a United States veterinarian, at the
plant, saw the attack on Dr. Hayes,
and at Hayes' command hastened to
find a doctor. Murphy followed Clark
and the latter ran into a side room.
Murphy followed, completely blocking
the doorway. A sudden change seemed
to come over the lunatic for a minute,
and he stepped to one side with a
pleasant "Hello, doctor," allowing Dr.
Clark to pass.

Employees who worked nearest Mur-
phy said that he seemed to pay par-
ticular attention to his slaughtering
knife, recently and had sharpened it
much more frequently than was his
habit.

Tonight Murphy is in the padded
cell of the Somerville police station.
When City Physician C. C. Towne at-
tempted to examine him Murphy
sprang at the doctor and attempted to
kick him.

No further attempt was made to
approach him.

MURPHY RAVES AND PRAYS.

Cambridge, Mass., June 6.—The
death of Dr. Daniel G. Hayes, who was
stabbed by John Murphy, the hog
butcher, who slew five men and ser-
iously wounded three at Somerville
yesterday, was expected hourly to-
night.

John Cheever and Joseph Chicosek,
who were also stabbed, are in a crit-
ical condition. In a padded cell in
the Somerville police station Murphy
allowed no one to approach him to-
day, and after hours of raving he be-
gan to pray.

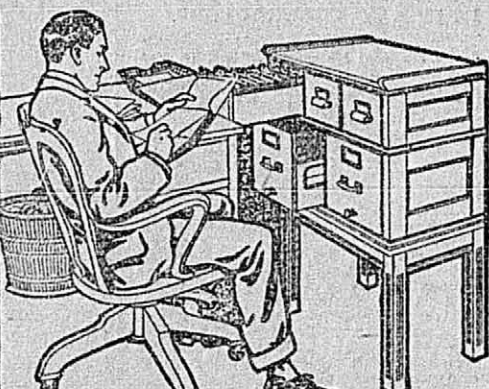
