## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Grocery Store Sold.**—C. J. Parker has bought the Windsor grocery on east Third South street.

**Horse Dropped Dead.**—A horse belonging to C. T. Coldwater dropped dead last evening, in front of the Sanitarium, from some ailment of the heart. The animal was drawing an empty wagon, and had not been over worked.
