

The remains of Oscar Williams, the well known cornice maker and tinsmith of Ogden, who died very unexpectedly Sunday afternoon at Green River, Wyoming, arrived in Ogden yesterday aftemoon at 2 o'clock, and were prepared for burial.

The particulars of Mr. Williams' death were brought to Ogden by his son, who was with him when he died. Only,a few days ago he left Ogden for Only, a few days ago he left Ogden for Green Elver to work on a large build-ing there, for which he had the con-tract for corplec and tin work. Sun-day he was helping to move a box of tin, when his hat blew off. He ran after it and returned to where the box was, and fell to the ground, seemingly in an exhausted condition. A physician was sent for, and did all that medical skill could do to revive him, but with no avail; he expired in about 20 minno avail; he expired in about 20 minutes afterwards.

Mr. Williams was an honest, upright Mr. Williams was an honest, upright man. He had been in business in Og-den for about three years. He leaves a wife and six children to survive him. A little over a year ago two of his little girls, aged 11 and 3, were killed in a cave-in at the city gravel plt, and now the sudden and unexpect-ed death of the father brings another every to the household. sorrow to the household.


Some of the farmers were fortunate enough to get their land watered for planting of spring wheat. During March and up to the present


