

LAWSON FAILS TO BEAT MC FARLAND IN TWO COLUMNS

Lanky Rider from San Jose Rides Around Iver in French Style Race.

SAMUELSON FALLS FLAT GAME FULL OF SURPRISES

Attempt to Break Record for the Mile Motor Established by Gussie Lawson a Distinct Failure.

The feature of the Salt Palace track races last evening was the failure of T. M. Samuelson to equal the mile motor flight against time made by Gussie Lawson in 1:05 on the same track a year ago. Samuelson was so confident of his ability to lower the record that he made two attempts, but the first he could do was 1:08 1/2. His second trial resulted in the slow time of 1:10 1/2, but thinking he could do better he asked for another trial and he asked two seconds off his first run. There was a slight wind blow, however, and this militated somewhat against any record breaking speed which may have lingered in Samuelson's motor.

McFARLAND WINS.
The French style sprint race between McFarland of San Jose, Cal., and Iver Lawson of Salt Lake resulted in a final victory for McFarland. The heat was won by Lawson, who was compelled to take the pace. McFarland, who has remarkable sprinting abilities, failed to pass his opponent the first time, but in the two succeeding heats his spirit was too much for Lawson, and the California boy took the race in 1:23 1/2.

LAWSON GETS TWO.
Other events of the evening were the half mile open professional, won by C. L. Hollister of Springfield, Mass., in one minute flat; unlimited Australian pursuit race, won by P. Lawrence, of San Francisco; two mile handicap race, also won by Lawrence; one mile handicap professional won by Walter DeMara in 1:55 3/4.

During the Australian pursuit race Phil Wright, of Salt Lake, had a bad fall, and his spirit was too much for him, however, it was announced that he had not suffered serious injury.
