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THE ORDINANCE

To Provide For Assessing

and Collecting City Taxes.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the

City Council of Salt Lake City,

That there is hereby directed to be

assessed and collected annually, be-

ginning with the year 1895, an ad-

valorem tax on all property within

the limits of Salt Lake City Cor-

poration, as provided by the laws

of the Territory of Utah, for the fol-

lowing named purposes, to wit:

Not to exceed five mills on the dol-

lar to defray the contingent ex-

penses of the city; not to exceed five

mills on the dollar to open, im-

prove, and keep in repair the

streets of the city; not to exceed one

and a quarter mill on the dol-

lar to control the water of said city.

Section 2. All property, real and

personal, situate and being in this

city, is taxable, except:

First. Property owned by the

United States;

Second. Bonds and other obliga-

tions of the United States;

Third. Property owned by this

city, by Salt Lake County, by Utah

Territory or by any school district;

Fourth. Houses and other build-

ings and land owned for religious

purposes, so long as the same are

used for public worship, and no

income is derived therefrom; but

this subdivision does not include

the residence of the minister, par-

son, or other person attendant upon

such denomination;

Fifth. Property owned by any

scientific, charitable or benevolent

society, so long as such property

and the income therefrom are used

exclusively for the public good;

Sixth. Public libraries, and liter-

ary and scientific collections, when

no income is derived therefrom;

Seventh. Private libraries and

collections of professional persons, so

long as the same are used exclu-

sively for the public good;

Eighth. Public squares and pub-

lic grounds, when no income is

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
