

## PARKS IN CENTER OF TWO STREETS

Committee Recommends Paving  
Improvements of Fourth  
And Seventh East.

ASPHALT ROADS EACH SIDE.

Abutters' Portion on Fourth East Will  
Be \$29,502 and City is to  
Pay \$1,656.09.

The city council committee on engineering at its regular meeting held last evening, decided to recommend that Fourth East and Seventh East streets, between South Temple and Third South streets, be paved with asphalt on either side of central parking plaza, similar to the present arrangement on Sixth East street. The marked portion of the street will be 24 feet wide, and the asphalt roadway on each side of the parking will be 24 feet wide also.

The city engineer has submitted an estimate of cost for the improvement on Fourth East street, which will be \$745 per foot, for the abutters' portion, or a total of \$29,502, the city's portion being \$1,656.09. The cost on Seventh East will be somewhat higher. It is said, as the ground is heavier and will cost more to work.

**PHONES TO BE INSTALLED.**  
The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company, through its local representative, Philip H. Irwin, informed the improvement committee that it was prepared to install the extra telephones called for by the ordinance regulating telephone companies recently passed by the council.

The resignation of J. T. Tyler as patrolman was accepted by the police and prison committee, and the appointment of Harold R. Martin will be recommended.

The fire committee recommended the appointment of E. T. Silver and Otto Smith as firemen.

The complaint of George Alder on the condition of Thirteenth East street, between Sixth and Seventh South streets, was taken up by the streets committee on streets and the department instructed to repair the east side of the street at a cost not to exceed \$15.

John E. Dooly Presents Two Buffaloes To American Society's Range.

The American Bison society's range in northwestern Montana will soon have added to its herd of buffalo two young animals from the herd on Antelope island. They are the gift of John E. Dooly, owner of the local bunch of well high extinct "kings of the plains." The presentation was made by Mr. Dooly upon the visit to this city of the society's secretary, Ernest Harold Baynes of Meridan, N. H.

There are but few places in the west where buffaloes are now to be found, and most of the herds have been visited by Mr. Baynes. A bunch known as the Conrad is located at the Goodnight herd. These Mr. Baynes discovered to be very tame. On the contrary, the animals on Antelope Island are unusually wild, and Mr. Baynes was on two occasions attacked while riding horseback among them for the purpose of taking photographs. The next herd to be inspected by Mr. Baynes is in Texas and known as the Goodnight herd.

**WATER FAMINE AT PRISON.**

Governor Cutler Sends Communication To City Council on Subject.

John C. Cutler, who is chairman of the board of corrections, which has charge of the management of the

state penitentiary, has addressed a communication to the city council in which he states that the penitentiary is in danger of a water famine, and into for supplying the prison with water for temporary until the litigation over the matter is finally decided. The governor sets forth that in 1897 an agreement was entered into to pay the city \$100 per year for permission to lay Parley's conduit. The city afterwards terminated this contract, and now the prison is threatened with a water shortage, as it has no means with which to pay for a new supply, save those appropriated by the last legislature for the purpose, which the board does not wish to use for temporary purposes. Gov. Cutler is of the opinion that the board and the city can easily make some arrangement which will be satisfactory until the matter can be permanently settled.

The communication will in all probability be presented to the next meeting of the city council Monday evening.

**TO WORK FOR GOOD ROADS.**

He was invited to stay at the city's boarding house. While a guest of Chief Pitt, Mr. McGovern will take a course of manual training,

specializing in rock crushing and road building. Mr. McGovern is an enthusiastic sportsman, as was evidenced in his sprint when he saw Patrolman Pitts, and he is overjoyed with the prospect of working on the new automobile speedway while in this city.

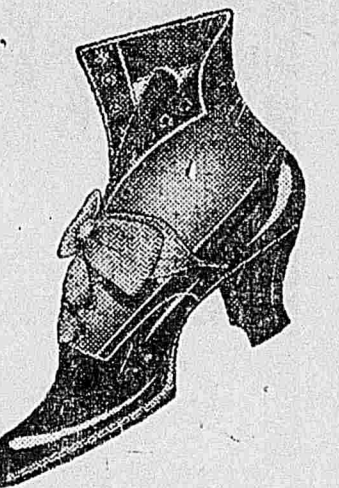
