



Committee Recommends Paving Improvements of Fourth And Seventh East.

ASPHALT ROADS EACH SIDE.

Abutters' Portion on Fourth East Will Be \$29,502 and City is to Pay \$1,656.09.

The city council committee on engineering at its regular meeting held last evening, decided to recommend that Fourth East and Seventh East streets, between South Temple and Third South streets, be paved with

Third South streets, be paved with asphalt on either side of central park-ing plats, similar to the present ar-rangement on Sixth East street. The parked portion of the street will be 24 feet wide, and the asphalt roadway on each side of the parking will be 24 feet wide also. The city engineer has submitted an estimate of cost for the improvement on Fourth East street, which will be \$7.45 per foot, for the abutters' por-tion, or a total of \$29,502, the city's portion being \$1,656.09. The cost on Seventh East will be somewhat high-er, it is said, as the ground is heavier and will cost more to work. PHONES TO BE INSTALLED.
