WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the upper Mississippi and Lower Missouri valleys, lake regions and the north Pacific states; and lowest over the southern plateau, northern Rocky Mountain slope and the British Northwest territories.

Precipitation occurred over portions of southwestern Utah, New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Illinois, and a rise of 10 degrees to 22 degrees over portions of Oregon, Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota. Light frost was reported at Kansas City, Missouri, and St. Paul, Minnesota.

Moderate temperature prevailed over the entire country, from the Pacific to the great lakes.

LOCAL BRIEFS.

The flowers that decorated St. Mark's cathedral at the Dickinson-Shulder wedding last night, were sent to St. Mark's hospital this morning.

David Currie, a peddler aged 60, was severely hurt yesterday afternoon, by the overturning of his cart at Fourth East and South Temple streets. Dr. Benedict attended Currie who was sent home.

Capt. Duncan McViehe received a telegram yesterday, from Colingwood, Ont., stating the death of his father at the age of 87. The old gentleman had lived a very active life, and was much respected.

Edward Evans, a Eureka miner, died at St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon of typhoid fever. Evans was one of the patients removed from the Keogh-Wright hospital at the time of the fire. He was 40 years of age and his remains will be shipped to Eureka this evening for burial.

Two saloon men, Joe Carrao, proprietor of the Continental bar, and Peter Lafaje, his bartender, were arrested by Officer Brown last night on the charge of selling liquor to minors.

They were compelled to deposit \$100 bail each to secure their appearance in court. Recently three young girls were arrested for drunkenness and the officers were informed that they had secured the liquor at Carrao's place.

The matter will be named before Judge Diehl.

A man giving his name as John Fredericks was arrested and locked up in jail last night on the charge of "pinching" a pocketbook belonging to a lady who was making a purchase in Auerbach's store yesterday afternoon.

The lady had laid the pocketbook on the counter and when she went to look for the purse was gone. Fredericks was suspected and placed under arrest.

When searched the pocketbook containing \$1 and a couple of rings was found on him.

United States Marshal B. B. Heywood went to Ogden yesterday taking with him a warrant for the arrest of Joseph Bragg who is in jail there charged with passing counterfeit coin during the meeting of the irrigation congress.

It is said that Bragg appeared in Ogden about the time the congress convened and had plenty of money which he spent at stores and other business places in the form of silver dollars receiving good money in change.

The counterfeiters were cleverly executed and hard to distinguish and it is believed the coin was manufactured in the vicinity of Ogden.

A prominent Colorado Springs lumberman named Hemmingsway, and five other lumbermen, will be in this city Friday, to institute here a lodge of the Consolidated Order of Loo-Hoo, or the Ancient and Antiquated Association of Black Cats. This is a purely social organization to which only lumber dealers and railroad freight men are eligible and the order has throughout the country about 4,000 members.
