In Far East is in Perfect Accord With the American-Japanese Agreement.

SMALL INTEREST IN BALKANS

Never Wanted Turkish Territory-Geographical Situation Not Suitable ---Stand by Austria-Hungary.

Berlin, Dec. 7 .--- Chancellor von Buelow, during the budget debate today, addressed the reichstag on Germany's foreign policy, dwelling at length on the southeast European sit-uation, the relations of Germany to France and Great Britain and Germany's attitude toward the American-Japanese understanding. He said the substance of the agreement had been substance of the agreement had been communicated to Germany by the Ger-man representatives of both countries. "The new arrangement," "he said, is thoroughly in harmony with the principles of Germany's policy in the far east, the open door, the preserva-tion of the status quo territorially and the integrity and independence of the Chinese empire. We have no occasion to regard the agreement otherwise

regard the agreement otherwise

to regard the agreement otherwise than sympathetically. It gives new support to our principles and addi-tional guarantee of peaceful develop-ment in the far cast." Answering a complaint that Ger-many was left out of the American-Japanese agreement, the chancellor called attention to the fact that Ger-many already has explicitly accepted the principles of the Anglo-German agreement of 1900 which guarantees maintenance of the "open door" and the territorial status quo. the territorial status quo.

The chancellor, in discussing the Balkan crisis, said the political situa-tion had been dominated for the past few months by the Turkish revolu-tion. The leaders in that movement were for the most part able army officers who had received their train-ing in Germany and had held credita-ble positions in the German army. The revision had heen carried on without

ble positions in the German army. The ravision had been carried on without bloodshed and the movement possess-ed a dignity which inspired the re-spect of the world. "It is our wish," said the chancellor, "to see Turkey politically and econ-omically strong, but we never want-ed Turkish territory from the fact that its geographical situation is not suita-ble. Turkey really lost nothing through-the annexation of Bosnia and ble. Turkey really lost nothing through the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina by Austria-Hungary. Neither did the independence of Bul-garia mean the loss of any territory. "From the very beginning two points were to me clear for the ex-ercise of German diplomacy—first, we must leave the lead in southeastern European politics to other powers, and, secondly, we must never hesitate for a moment to stand faithfully by our ally Austria-Hungary. We were in-formed of Austria's intention to annex Bosnia and Herzegovina about the same time Russia and Italy received similar notifications."

A SUCCESSFUL SUICIDE.

After Trying Three Times G. W. Sulker Killed Himself.

New York, Dec. 8 .- After having failed twice to take his life, George W. Sulker, a Brooklyn provision merchant was successful last night, shooting himself through the heart. His 13-year-old daughter Irene was sitting near him

daughter Irene was sitting near him when he fired the shot. Sulker was to have been arraigned in court today on a charge of felonious assault on Mrs. Mary J. Sample, of Brooklyn who was found bound and gagged in her home in September last, terribly burned with acid, which had been poured on her bare flesh. Mrs. Sample said that she had been black-mailed. Her story resulted in the ar-Sample said that she had been black-mailed. Her story resulted in the ar-rest of Sulker, who admitted that he had borrowed money from the woman, but denied being implicated in the at-tack. Since his release on ball, Sulker had been despondent. He tried to end his life by gas asphysiation on Satur-day and on Sunday repeated the atday and on Sunday repeated the at-tempt with a carving knife. His wife restrained him on both occasions.

HAYTIEN POLITICAL SITUATION CLEARING

Port au Prince, Dec. 7.—The poli-tical situation is clearing, at least in certain directions. During the recent interview here between General certain directions. During the recent interview here between General Simon, the leader of the revolution-ary movement, that resulted in the flight of Nord Alexis from the capital, and General Fouchard, an aspirant to the presidency, the latter said that in view of the fact that "God had blessed the arms of General Simon," he withdrew his candidacy in order that the possibility of civil war be averted. The proclamation of General Simon as president of the republic was then decided upon. The local population has accepted the new or-der of things. All the senators and dep-uties at present in Port au Prince are convinced that the election of General Simon by a large majority is assured, but it is argued that the elec-tions should be held without loss of time, so that the other presidential candidates be not able to bring for-ward an organized resistance and in order to avoid American intervention.

The Russo-Italian agreement, it is learned, is based on a declaration of mutual disinterestedness in the Balkans and a guarantee that the integrity of Turkey will be preserved.

EVANGELISM DENOUNCED

MODERN METHODS OF

Chicago, Dec. S.-Rev. W. H. Geist-weit, a former Chicago pastor and now head of a Peoria church, before a con-ference of 60 Baptist ministers here today, denounced modern methods of evangelism. Ho characterized them as: "A three-ringed circus, a vaudeville show, a bazar, and lastly a pulpit. These so-called 'social' systems of reaching the people and making con-verts may bring people to church, but they do not make them Christians. "The entire statistical idea of get-ting more and more baptisms is work-ing the ruin of real conversion," con-tinued Rev. Mr. Geistweit, "and is making the church a mere ecclesiastical refrigerator. Pastors advertise so many baptisms every Sunday. Perhaps they do what they advertise, but do they take care of the religious health of the baptised? In but very few in-stances.

"That is what has lead many to adopt "That is what has lead many to adopt this vaudeville system of instilling re-ligion. How they expect to find the gospel in the gypsy tent or the bazar, in the pillow raffle or the lemonade booth is more than I can comprehend. But they do expect it. "They bring people to the baptismal font, and after that neglect them or foist them on other ministers. I for one am heartily sick of earing for the people baptised by over ministers. Tired of it all. That is why, although I wished to go where the Lord called I prayed 'O Lord, send me anywhere but Chicago."

MRS. FLORENCE MAYBRICK WINS LAND SUIT

Richmond, Va., Dec. 7 .- The case of Mrs. Florence Maybrick and her moth-er, Baroness Pon Roque of New York, involving title to land said to be worth about \$2,500,000, was decided in their favor in the chancery court today. favor in the chancery court today. Under the decree deeds conveying 2,500,000 acres of land in Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky to D. W. Arm-strong of New York, former counsel for Mrs. Maybrick and her mother, are set aside, and Armstrong is ordered to give an accounting of all lands and money handled by him while their at-

torney. They inherited land from the first husband of the baroness. They employed Armstrong as attorney to se-cure deeds to the enormous tracts of

cure deeds to the enormous tracts of land shortly after the death of Mrs. Maybrick's husband, for which she served a term in British prisons. Atty. Armstrong, they charged, sold one tract of land for \$85,000, after which he is said to have represented that the whole property, comprising 2,500,000 acres, was worth only \$10,000, and bought it himself at that price, after receiving \$85,000 for a single tract, which was only one-thirtieth of the which was only one-thirtieth of the whole property.

FIDELITY FUNDING **COMPANY AFFARS**

New York, Dec. 7.-That the af-fairs of the Fidelity Funding company, opened in 1894 to finance Catholic building operations, and which went into the hands of a receiver a few weeks ago, are in an exceedingly tan-

weeks ago, are in an exceedingly tan-gled condition was asserted by Re-ceiver Thomas F. Gilroy, Jr., in a statment today. According to Receiver Gilroy the company's liabilities will aggregate not less than \$4,500,000, with practically no assets. Its creditors include fifty churches, seminaries, colleges and churches, seminaries, colleges and many priests and nuns. These are located from the New England states to Oregon. Chief among the company's

creditors is St. Mary's academy of Nauvoo, Ill., which is involved for at least \$500,000.

"I cannot give even an approximate idea of the company's affairs at this time," said Receiver Gilroy, "as some of the most important books and papers are missing. I understand that President Kieran of the company estimated them as his personal pro-

perty." Most of the company's loans were to run for 20 years. In addition to these loans the company also issued

these loans the company also issued life insurance against the lives of priests and nuns, The company, it seeme also sold its bonds to representatives of the Catholic church. There are secured, according to the receiver, by mortga-ges on property, but how much may be recovered from this source it is as yet impossible to say.

RUSSIA'S POSITION TOWARDS AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

St. Petersburg, Dec. 3.—The slow progress of the negotiations with Aus-tria, probably will entail a short de-lay in the appearance of M. Iswolsky, the foreign minister in the duma which was scheduled for Wednesday next. To meet the complaints of the newspapers and the public against the minister's prolonged silence an author-ize' statement on the Russian position, correcting a number of rumors in clr-culation, has been issued, the main points of which follow: The Russian government has neither directly nor indirectly encouraged a sep-arate Austro-Turkish agreement re-lative to the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina. M. Iswolsky has never in

lative to the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina. M. Iswolsky has never in the name of Russia consented to the final annexation of those provinces. If the powers at the conference find it necessary to ratify the annexation Russia will insist on compensation for the interested Balkan states. Russia is in full sympathy with the negotia-tions looking to an alliance between the Balkan states.

Balkan states. With regard to the possibility of hos-tilities, it is admitted that certain in-terests in Austra-Hungary are in favor of forcing a conflict with Servia and forcing a conflict with Servia and of forcing a conflict with Servia and Montenegro, but these efforts have not been successful. The Austrian cabinet has been given most categorical assur-ances that the Austrian military mea-sures which recently have been under-taken are devoid of aggressive intent, while Servia and Montenegro have been solemnly and repeatedly warned of the dangar of provocatory steps.
